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Rabbi's Message

Over the past decade, studies have shown time and time again that the number one factor affecting our children's Jewish identity is camp. Having just returned from two weeks as a member of the faculty at URJ camp Olin Sang Ruby Union Institute (OSRUI), this statistic is on my mind. What I saw at OSRUI this summer helps to explain why camp is such a pivotal experience for so many young people. Allow me to elaborate:



Each morning in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, some four hundred campers, staff, faculty members, and specialists, begin their day

bright and early with a morning service. Blessings are recited before and after all meals, and Hebrew songs are part of the post-meal song sessions. Daily activities are called by their Hebrew names, e.g. *chugim*, which are electives like art, dance, drama, or horseback riding, and Jewish study themes like the prophets or *Tikkun Olam*, are integrated into the program through text study and age appropriate activities which make the theme both interesting and relevant to the *chanichim*, the campers.

President's Message

As we approach the High Holy Days we are supposed to look at what we have done over the past year and prepare to atone for our transgressions toward our fellow human beings so we can be inscribed in the Book of Life for another year. Whether or not we believe there really is that book doesn't matter. In essence we are asked to turn inward and examine our outward actions. That isn't an easy task. How many actually do this?

Why do so many of us attend services during the High Holy Days? For some it is tradition. For others it is to reconnect with Judaism. For some it is to reconnect with fellow members of our community. For some it may be a twinge of guilt. For others it could be to hear familiar melodies and prayers.

As we gather together we may notice who is there, but even more so we notice who is not there. We may realize that there are seats that were filled last year but are empty because of death. We notice who isn't there because they have moved far away. We notice the absence of family members who cannot be home for the holidays.

Sometimes some feel uncomfortable if new prayers or music is included that don't match what some remember from youth or previous services. They think "Is Reform Judaism becoming less Reform?" That is a question that is whispered or spoken by some.

If we remember that Reform Judaism is firmly rooted in Jewish tradition but

Nearly thirty Israelis serve as part of the camp's *tzevet*, the staff, and interacting with our young people, help to teach them about Israel, Israeli culture, and connect them to the Jewish homeland.

In the case of the unit or *eidah* with which I worked, *Tiferet*, campers focused on the fine arts, studied the Psalms in conjunction with their studies in music, drama, visual arts, digital arts (media), and dance. Music students composed and arranged melodies based on the text of the Psalms, while visual art students explored the themes of personal struggle and redemption, both prevalent in the Psalms, in the pieces that they created. Dancers expressed the Psalms in movement, choreographing an original piece based upon the texts to which they most connected, while drama students wrote and put on a show of nearly sixty short scenes, bringing to life the imagined inner dialogue of King David, to whom the Psalms are attributed.

This is just one example of what is going on at Jewish summer camps throughout the country, a unique and powerful experience wherein campers learn to see the world through Jewish eyes, and to live in a Jewish context. And this, I believe, is the primary reason that camp is so successful at creating and bolstering Jewish identity. When one lives out one's Judaism in every aspect of his or her life, rather than Judaism being just one aspect of his or her identity, then one can truly feel connected to one's heritage. At camp, swimming and art are just as much Jewish activities as services and Hebrew classes are, and being Jewish informs everything that our campers do.

In this, I believe is a powerful lesson for us all. Too often, we associate Judaism with the synagogue, with prayer that's in a language we can't understand, and with long boring classes in Sunday school.

So many adults say they got turned off when they were young, because the Judaism they knew was meaningless to them. Camp provides us with a model, which, I think, reflects what Judaism truly is and ought to be: a tradition that's lived out in every aspect of our lives, within the walls of the synagogue and beyond. If we can break through the psychological barriers we tend to create for ourselves, and learn to see the world through Jewish eyes, I suspect that the rich tradition of our parents and grandparents would come to life for us, and that we would find ourselves connected to it in a way we once thought impossible. The next time you are at the grocery store or at the gym, ask yourself what's Jewish about an apple or a treadmill? The answer might surprise you, and, I hope add new, rich dimension to your shopping or your workout. In the year to come, I hope that seeing the world through Jewish eyes can help transform and enrich your Jewish identity.

As part of Rabbi Harari's rabbinic contract, she will be serving as High Holy Days rabbi for Congregation Am Echad. They will be conducting their services at a rented facility. We will be in our building and have secured the services of Rabbi Rachel Sabath Beit-Halachmi. Rabbi Sabath Beit-Halachmi is the National Director of Recruitment and Admissions, President's Scholar and Director of the Office of Community Engagement at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. She was ordained at HUC-JIR, New York in 1995. Rabbi Sabath Beit-Halachmi writes a monthly column in the *Jerusalem Post* and other publications. She teaches and mentors students at HUC-JIR and speaks throughout North America on leadership, Israel, gender and theology. She was raised in Minneapolis, lived in Israel for nearly 15 years and currently lives in Cincinnati with her husband and their three children.

BYBS has a funeral plan with Chicago Jewish Funerals, which is available for members and their immediate families at their option. To select this plan, simply call Chicago Jewish Funerals at 847-229-8822 and tell them that you are a B'nai Yehuda Beth Sholom member. They will handle all the details. The plan includes professional services of funeral director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse/graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment for chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor candle*, *kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, *kipot* and 50 standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$5,850. For further details, call the Temple office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it. **If you wish to observe a Yarzheit, please send the name and secular or Hebrew date to Cathy @ Temple Office.**


Sisterhood News

Don't forget to send in your Sisterhood membership if you haven't already done so. On behalf of the Sisterhood board, I wish you and your families a happy and healthy new year.




IJGS ANNUAL DELI DINNER
