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Rabbi's Message

ne of the most well known tropes in the Jewish tradition is the oft repeated notion of Zecher Liy'tzi'at Mitzrayim, a remembrance of the Exodus from Egypt. In fact, there is hardly a festival on the Jewish calendar that isn't directly linked with the idea. For us, a people born out of slavery, the



Exodus holds particular significance. In the wilderness, at Sinai, we stood at the foot of a mountain and took on the rights and responsibilities associated with nationhood. It is easy to appreciate all of the blessings that this encounter provided, first and foremost the freedom to worship God as we

are commanded. But it is also easy to take for granted the responsibilities associated with that freedom. One such responsibility explains the association of Shabbat and festival times with the idea of Zecher Liy'tzi'at Mitzrayim, a remembrance of the Exodus from Egypt. Perhaps the most important responsibility we have is to remember; we must never forget what it feels like to be enslaved, lest we return to a state of subjugation.

At Sinai, we accepted the Torah, and bound to its laws, we became one. We were free, free to follow its teachings, to worship our God. Thousands of years later we remain the guarantors of that freedom we accepted so long ago. As we prepare to enter into a New Year, we seek to affirm this freedom. Yet unlike so many other appointed times on our calendar, Rosh HaShanah does not initially call to mind a remembrance of the Exodus from Egypt. Rather, at this time of year, we are charged to remember the sound of the Shofar. Though our Exodus from Egypt is mentioned in the festival Kiddush, our thoughts tend to stray from slavery and freedom at this season. (cont. on page 3)

President's Message



t is 5775. So what? Besides being a palindrome, what does the year 5775 mean? Is it just another year in the Hebrew calendar where we say "Whew, we survived"? We have said the prayers for a sweet, healthy year; asked to be inscribed in the Book of Life; fasted

(or not), said or sent greetings to our temple family and community; will build, celebrate, and dwell symbolically in the sukkah; will unroll the Torah and start again with Genesis; and eventually sigh and fall back into our daily routines of 2014. We don't have to remember to write 5775 on checks nor does 5775 come up in daily conversations. So...?

The fact that 5775 can be divided by 7 makes it Shmita, a year of rest. While historically this applies to letting land lie fallow for a year and forgiving all individual debts in Israel, it could also have meaning for the 98% in Israel who are not farmers and for us who do not live in Israel.

There is a proposed program in Israel to help provide debt-relief for 5000 families. Private philanthropies worldwide are chipping in for this. But what about here? There are families in our community (at least 30) who need financial and material help. Is this an opportunity to make it a shmita year for them?

How do we extend the idea of shmita beyond finance and agriculture? We are a people on the run and shimta tells us to stop—not for day, but for a year! Shabbat is supposed to be a time to stop for 25 hours, but for many it really is never that. Could we put ourselves on the side this year and focus on social, environmental, and economic values?

Rabbi Yosef Zvi Rimon, founding director of the Halacha Education Center based in Alon Shvut, said "It's a year when you have time to listen to your soul, to yourself, when you can be attached to your family—to be with them, to have time with them. A year to listen to nature." I would add the word "community" to his words. There will be many opportunities to listen to, be attached to, be with, and have time with the BYBS community. Let's think about the many ways we can have a shmita year.

So how is this central Jewish idea connected to the New Year? Rabbi, professor, and author, Art Green, teaches that we are still enslaved. It may not be as a people, or in the traditional sense of the word. But each of us has something that controls us, something that holds us back, someplace in our life where we are stuck. At this time of turning, when we are tasked with the act of Cheshbon HaNefesh, an accounting of our souls, perhaps we also need to ask ourselves: What is MY Egypt? And, in turn, how do I come out of it? The great Hassidic master Rabbi Nachman of Bretzlav taught, when leaving Egypt, do not stop to ask what will I do out there. If you do, you'll never get out. Fear of the unknown can be paralyzing. And yet, so many years ago, our ancestors took a chance, and, believing in Moses and his abilities, went forth from Egypt into the literal and metaphorical wilderness. Maybe the task or remembering the Exodus from Egypt is so central to our identity as Jews because without it, we might also forget our people's courage in taking those first few steps into community, and into freedom.

This year, as we prepare to enter into a New Year, let us ask ourselves: what is My personal Egypt? What are those things that are enslaving me? And, recalling Israel's bravery, be inspired to move, ourselves, from the narrow places which constrict us, and into the freedom of fulfillment and the realization of the best selves we can be.

in 1977. He is a noted lecturer with many published credentials to his credit.



BYBS has a funeral plan with Chicago Jewish Funerals, which is available for members and their immediate families at their option. To select this plan, simply call Chicago Jewish Funerals at 847-229-8822 and tell them that you are a B'nai Yehuda Beth Sholom member. They will handle all the details. The plan includes professional services of funeral director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse/graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment for chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor candle, kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, *kipot and 50* standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$5,850. For further details, call the Temple office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it. If you wish to observe a Yarzheit, please send the name and secular or Hebrew date to Cathy at the temple office.
