Rabbi's Message

Just a few weeks ago, I had the experience of a lifetime. On a Wednesday evening, I rode up to Midway airport in order to welcome home a group of one hundred veterans returning from an Honor Flight. Established in 2008, Honor Flight Chicago has the following mission: "...to thank and pay tribute to these heroes—especially our World War II and Korean War veterans—by bringing them to Washington, D.C. for a day of honor and remembrance at no cost to them. There are an estimated 53,000 WWII and Korean War veterans living in the Chicagoland area—and we want to reach and honor each and every one." (www.honorflightchicago.org).

On this particular evening, I was especially honored to be there as we paid tribute to two veterans among the hundred: Congregation Am Echad members Elliott Greenberg and Les Katz. I would estimate nearly a thousand or more people were there to greet the veterans. A brass band and bagpipers welcomed them with music, while boy scouts in uniform carried signs and large American flags. As the veterans arrived, each was accompanied by a current member of the military. Disembarking from the elevator, they made their way through the crowd, like a parade of sorts, shaking hands and interacting with so many who had come with one message: Thank you for your service.

President's Message

HOW MAX JANOWSKI CHANGED MY LIFE

I was thirteen, and at High Day services at Beth Sholom with my family.



There was a choir singing this wonderful music, most of it new to me, being from Boston. Then I heard something so beautiful, that I felt lifted. It turns out I was listening to *Avinu Malkeynu* by Max Janowski.

I must have heard it several times over the holidays, because it imprinted on me.....forever! When my family moved to Morton Grove, we joined the newly-merged B'nai Jehoshua Beth Elohim. And I heard this same beautiful music there during the High Holy Days. Max Janowski, Max Janowski, Max Janowski!

I joined the concert choir at Maine East High School, because I knew I had to sing in a choir. With that kind of "expertise" under my belt, I was ready to join the temple choir and sing *Avinu Malkeynu*. I was told I would have to wait until I was twenty one, because the adult choir members told dirty jokes, and my membership would cramp their style. All I had wanted to do was sing *Avinu Malkeynu*. That was all! I had already sung large portions of *The Messiah* by Handel, *Gloria* by Vivaldi, *Ave Verum Corpus* by Mozart. Why was I not being permitted to sing *Avinu Malkeynu*? I majored in music at college, and and I sang in various choral groups. I sang *Carmina Burana* by Orff, *King David* by Honneger, and *Requiem* by Brahms. Janowski? Forget-a-bout-it!

It was truly a remarkable sight, as veterans of World War II and the Korean War came through. They had no idea they'd be welcomed in this way; some were moved to tears, others remarked how they felt like politicians as they made their way down the line, shaking hands. Most had beaming smiles, and some were at a loss for words. Simply put, it was a truly extraordinary moment.

Having grown up in Israel, the military played a large part in my life. I can remember my father coming home from *milu'im*, his yearly month of military service, and leaning an M16 against the wall in our apartment's hallway. I remember my cousins' army induction ceremonies, and I can recall the stories I've heard from my family and friends about their experiences in service. Though personally exempt from service, like every Israeli, I grew up with a deep sense of respect for the IDF.

On May 11, Israel will mark *Yom HaZikaron*, Memorial Day for Fallen Soldiers. There, a ceremony at Mt. Herzl cemetery will open a national day of mourning. In the words of the poet Natan Alterman, the young men and women who serve are the silver platter upon which the state is founded. Every life is precious to every Israeli; we remember, *together*. In the morning, a two minute siren is sounded, piercing through the silence of the day. And as literally the entire country stands still, we pause to remember all those who bravely gave their lives so that the Jewish homeland might flourish. This is among the most powerful expressions of remembrance that I have experienced.

Here in the south suburbs, we are extraordinarily blessed to have among us so many veterans. Our Sam Nyvelt Post of the Jewish War Veterans brings our veterans together on a weekly basis, and our congregations have a beautiful tradition of special services on the Shabbat closest to Veteran's Day.

Still, as we come upon our own Memorial Day on the calendar, I find myself baffled by what the day has become for many Americans—a day of vacations and barbeques, a long weekend not unlike any other. Without a direct connection to the military in my family – my grandfather, a Captain in the U.S. Army during WWII, died when I was 18 – my family was like those many Americans for many years. I used to wonder why Israel’s Memorial Day was so serious and the American one was not. Sadly, Israel’s survival as a country depends on mandatory military service from every one of its citizens. But here in the U.S., it is very easy to take for granted the service of so many of our citizens, without whose courage and service, we would not have the freedoms that we enjoy each day. That reality has especially hit home for me, as I have officiated at a number of services at Abraham Lincoln Military Cemetery in Joliet over the past few years.

It was not until I was older that I became aware of the fact that many remembrance services take place throughout the nation on Memorial Day. In many communities, veterans pay tribute to their brothers and sisters in arms, and people gather to memorialize our fallen heroes who paid the ultimate price so that we might live free. I am ever grateful to know that our fallen servicemen and women are not forgotten, and I hope that this coming *Yom HaZikaron* and Memorial Day, respectively, wherever you are, you’ll pause and take a few moments to thank and to remember them.

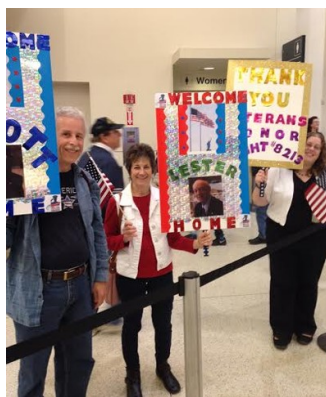

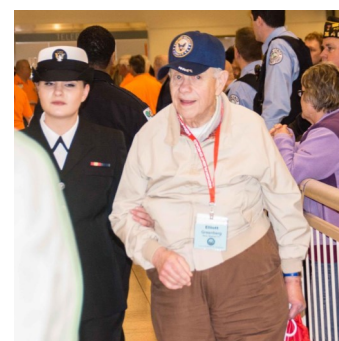

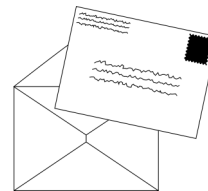

P.S. Our choir at BYBS tells better dirty jokes than the choir at BJBE.....

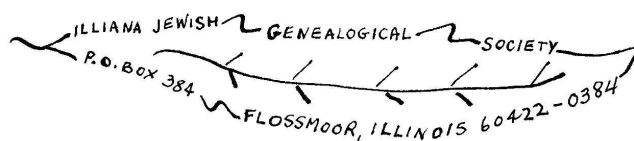

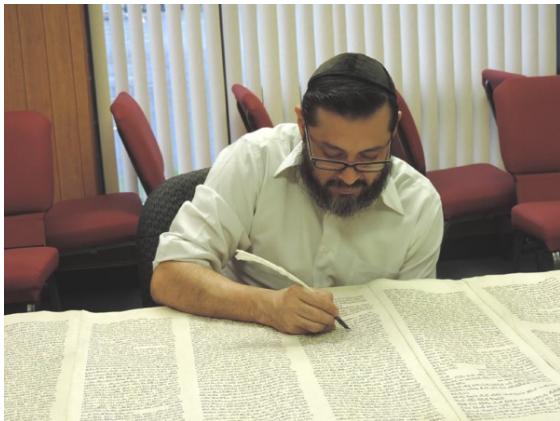

BYBS Funeral Plan

BYBS has a funeral plan with Chicago Jewish Funerals, which is available for members and their immediate families at their option. To select this plan, simply call Chicago Jewish Funerals at 847-229-8822 and tell them that you are a B'nai Yehuda Beth Sholom member. They will handle all the details. The plan includes professional services of funeral director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse/graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment for chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor candle*, *kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, *kipot* and 50 standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$5,850. For further details, call the Temple office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it. **If you wish to observe a Yahrzeit, please send the name and secular or Hebrew date to Cathy Burnett at office@bybs.org.**
