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Rabbi's Message

I am the daughter of privilege; privileged to have grown up at an age where women enjoyed the beginnings of a relative parity to men in so many ways. At thirty, I was blessed - or naïve enough to say that my gender played little or no role in the ways that I'd been treated throughout my life.

Ironically today, in an age where gender has become



more fluid and free, I feel a far stronger connection to my own status as a woman than ever before. As stories of discrimination toward women and sexual abuse flood the headlines, I find myself struggling to accept that the relative privilege of my own youth was really just a

fallacy.

At Purim, I saw the #MeToo label applied to Vashti. It was a clever costume idea, but sadly, it was also a reading of the megillah that is wholly necessary and appropriate in this day and age. For years, Vashti and Esther's mistreatment, at the hands of Achashverosh, was whitewashed as the story was retold. Vashti didn't want to 'dance' for the king and his buddies, while Esther's participation in and eventual win of the 'beauty pageant' was likened becoming Miss America – complete with roses, a sash, and a tiara. Were it that this version of the story was the true one...

But Pesach is upon us, and it would be easy to just sweep this issue under the rug for another year. Surely, Passover has no such stories. But just

because the connection is not so overt or obvious, it doesn't mean that the issue of women and their status is a non-existent one. In fact, I'd argue it is one that must remain central to our celebrations. At a time when our people celebrates its freedom from enslavement in Egypt, it seems especially appropriate to think about the enslavement of women.

Most obviously, this would seem a reference the horrendous practice of human trafficking, which especially affects young women and girls. But in the wake of the #MeToo movement, I am especially cognizant of ways in which men-particularly those with much wealth, power, and influence - still metaphorically keep women enslaved. In 2018, large companies still hire women for pennies on the dollar - if they hire them at all - while men are often hired for the same jobs, earning sometimes twice as much as their female counterparts. Similarly, men in powerful positions often abuse their power, forcing women to degrade themselves just to get cast in a film, hired for a job, or keep the job they have. In 2018, women are still judged in ways that no-one would dare judge men, and we are held to unhealthy standards while our male counterparts enjoy relative freedom from such boundaries.

So, at a time when we, the Jewish people, celebrate freedom, we must pause to consider how women remain enslaved in this day and age. And just as women like Miriam, Tzipora, and Yocheved are celebrated in the Pesach story, we must continue to celebrate women who have paved the way to freedom, and those who still continue to fight for justice. As The Wandering is Over Haggadah: Including Women's *Voices* puts it at the concluding section of the seder: "Though it comes at the end of the seder, this moment also marks a beginning. We are beginning the next season with a renewed awareness of the freedoms we enjoy and the obstacles we must still confront. We are looking forward to the time we gather together again. Having retold stories of the Jewish people, recalled historic movements of liberation, and reflected on the struggles people still

BYBS Funeral Plan

BYBS has a funeral plan with Chicago Jewish Funerals, which is available for members and their immediate families at their option. To select this plan, simply call Chicago Jewish Funerals at 847-229-8822 and tell them that you are a B'nai Yehuda Beth Sholom member. They will handle all the details. The plan includes professional services of funeral director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse/graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment for chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor candle*, *kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, *kipot and 50* standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$6,400. For further details, call the Temple office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it.
