### **Ritual Committee Letter**

We are writing this during the month of Elul, the last month of the Jewish year. Next month is Tishrei, and with it comes Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and all that a new year brings. Traditionally, Elul is a month of reflection, punctuated by the blowing of the shofar every morning. While we at Shir Tikvah do not blow shofar every day, it is incumbent upon each of us to begin the self-examination that leads up to the beginning of a new year. In addition to reflecting on ourselves, what is good, what needs improvement, what should stay the same, what we should change, it is a good time to reflect on some of our institutional practices, and to make some changes. As we start our first new year as Shir Tikvah, this is a really good time to clean house, so to speak, to tweak the way we do a few things.

One change we are going to make with the new year is how we maintain our mi sheberach list. First, we are going to start the new year with a new mi sheberach list. At present, the mi sheberach list has names of people nobody knows, and also of people who are healthy and no longer want or need to be on the mi sheberach list. Secondly, we are going to a new policy of putting names on the mi sheberach list for six weeks, at which point the name will be removed unless the person who submitted the name resubmits it. That will help streamline the list and allow names which belong on the list to be read expeditiously while avoiding reading names of people who do not need or want their names to be there. As always, during every Shabbat service we will continue to ask people to say names of people for whom they want to say a mi sheberach prayer for healing.

Another change we are going to make in the new year is we are going to start having joint kiddushes every Shabbat. We have done it several times over the past few months and it has been so nice to come together as one community after services. The plan is for both Reform and Conservative services to finish at 12:15 pm. We will alternate, week by week, which minyan will set out the kiddush. Each minyan, Reform and Conservative, will maintain its kiddush traditions. In the case of the Reform minvan, we will continue encouraging people to bring homemade challahs and goodies for the kiddush. The Conservative kiddush will continue to come out of the kosher kitchen. To avoid confusion, kiddushes set up by people from the Reform minyan will be set up on blue tablecloths, and kiddushes set up by people from the Conservative minyan will be set up on gray tablecloths. Kosher challah from the kosher kitchen will always be available for anyone who prefers a strictly kosher challah.

As in the past, we will continue to combine Shabbat morning services for any special event such as a bar/bat mitzvah, a baby naming, an aufruf, a mini-grant, or a special weekend such as when we have a scholar-in-residence. We will have separate kiddushes on any Shabbat when we know it will be difficult to end the Conservative service by 12:15.

Ever since Rabbi Harari came to the south suburbs five years ago, she has been leading Friday night services according to the Reform practice, and Saturday morning services according to Conservative practice. The Reform Saturday morning service has been lay-led. For the last few years, we have had four Shabbatot

per year when Rabbi Harari leads a Conservative Friday night service and a Reform Saturday morning service. On those Shabbatot, the Friday evening Reform service and the Saturday morning Conservative services are lay -led. This system of "flip-flopping" has been working really well, and we plan to continue it. Read your weekly "What's happening at Shir Tikvah" and the monthly bulletin to see when those special "flip-flop" services are planned.

Occasionally, although more often than in the past, one or the other Saturday morning service has trouble making a minyan. On those mornings the smaller group usually joins the larger service. But that is not always what everyone wants, so we would like to try to continue holding both Reform and Conservative services on Shabbat mornings. This is the biggest change we are suggesting for this year - come to Shabbat services more often! Even if you don't feel particularly "spiritual" on any given Saturday morning, consider coming anyway! Coming to services is a mitzvah, you will be helping make a minyan, there is value in the idea of community, and perhaps you will find something unexpectedly meaningful in the service itself. It is one habit that it is good to get hooked on, and the start of a new year is a perfect time to give it a try.

Rabbi Harari has created a giant calendar for the month of Elul and it stands just outside the sanctuary, in the foyer. She has been posting new "food for thought" every day. Please make sure to look at it when you are at Shir Tikvah, and if you have no specific reason to be at Shir Tikvah, come on over and read it. We have each found that it makes us stop for a second and contemplate the year that is almost over and the year that is about to begin. We hope it does the same for you.

# **President's Letter**

New, Nu, Gnu—These three interesting homophones apply to Shir Tikvah, but they also apply to this time of the year—the time of the High Holidays, the time of Sukkot, the time of Simchat Torah. The first two may be obvious to you, but let us look at all three to see the relationship. "New" is what we are—a new consolidation, a new name, a new congregation. Rosh Hashanah is the start of the new year, and during Simchat Torah, we start a new reading of the Torah cycle. During Sukkot, we commemorate the wanderings of the Israelites as they searched for a new home and a new life. When one looks at our congregation, one sees many different personalities, each of whom has his or her own strengths, just as when one looks at the word "new," one may see at least 15 different definitions and 45 different synonyms, each with its own nuance. "New" implies hope, a chance to start over, a chance to improve. We at Shir Tikvah, Song of Hope, also have this wonderful opportunity to recreate ourselves as a new entity, one that embraces both the tenets of Reform Judaism and Conservative Judaism, one that has respect for individual differences.

"Nu" is not just a Yiddish word; it is the 13th letter of the Greek alphabet, the start of a new half. This "nu" also has many different meanings. With a numerical value of 50, it can also represent values in statistics, physics, mechanics, biology, calculus. What "nu" may mean to us depends on our background, on the point from which we view this word. In the same way, the meaning of the holidays depends on our viewpoint when we enter into each of them, for we each have a slightly different focus as we reflect and pray. Think of a kaleidoscope. One kaleidoscope will have a constant number of pebbles or other objects in it, but each of us, when we look through it, will see something different, and as we rotate through the circle of our life, the kaleidoscope will rotate, too, so that when we come back, we will see something new.

"Nu", in Yiddish, is a word that calls for a reply. So? Huh? Well? What's up? Judaism is a religion of questions, and this time of the year, we seem to have so many of them. The Torah and Haftorah portions raise many questions about the text and about our relationship with G-d. As we reflect on the past year and move forward to the new one, we question how we can be better people. Our questions for you are what is your vision for Shir Tikvah? What can you do to help us achieve this vision?

Finally, we come to the last of the homonyms: gnu. A gnu or wildebeest is probably the most successful of the African herbivores (We guess we could stretch the analogy a bit by mentioning that Rabbi Harari is a vegetarian.), but it is also highly gregarious. We are so excited to see everyone intermingling when we have combined Kiddushes, dinners or other social activities. This year, we will have a combined break fast at the end of Yom Kippur, so, again, we will have a chance to socialize in a meaningful, communal event. But GNU (technically pronounced g'noo) has another meaning. Perhaps you know it as Linux—a free operating system software package. From their website, we learn that having free software enables one to have four freedoms:

- "The freedom to run the program as you wish, for any purpose.
- The freedom to study how the program works, and adapt it to your needs .
- The freedom to redistribute copies so you can help your neighbor.
- The freedom to improve the program, and release your improvements to the public, so that the whole community benefits."

Nu? So at our new congregation, Shir Tikvah, do we not also have an adaption of these four freedoms:

- The freedom to run our congregation as you wish, for the purposes we define.
- The freedom to study how the congregation works, and adapt it to our needs.

- The freedom to designate our resources to help our neighboring congregants.
- The freedom to improve the congregation, and to release our improvements to the public, so that the whole community benefits.

We would like to take this time to thank all the volunteers, especially the board members, who have given of their time as we slowly enter this new territory. Transition takes time, patience, and people. We could not have gotten this far without your support, ideas, and energy.

Thank you, thank you, thank you.
