SHIR Tikvah KOL NIDRE ADDRESS 5779

L'Shana Tova and Mazel Tov to all of us, as we celebrate our first High Holiday services here as Shir Tikvah. We are all part of a wonderful and unique experience as we work together to build a new entity. Bringing with us our individual practices and traditions while creating new ones, we will carry forward the best of Congregation Am Echad and B'nai Yehuda Beth Sholom as we move into year 5779.

Shema Yisraeil. Hear O Israel. And so, daily, we are exhorted to hear. The High Holidays can be thought of as a time to communicate—to talk and to hear—with G-d, with each other, with ourselves. As we communicate, we hear, but do we listen? Do we try to understand what we hear and why we are hearing it? Last week, Sherry heard the shofar being blown at Johannesburg International Airport. During the month of Elul, the tradition is to blow the shofar each weekday to remind us, but to remind us of what? The shofar is an awakening to listen, an alarm clock that tells us to get up, look around, take action to improve not only ourselves, but also the world around us. Our world cannot be improved without our participation in it. Rabbi Neil Blumofe of Austin, Texas stated, "We do not have to merely accept the world as it is — submitting to our powerlessness. The shofar reminds us that we are powerful, and that we have agency, and that like Abraham, we have the capacity to change our ways, recognizing the necessity of fresh perspective and a connection to a sovereignty beyond ourselves." Part of the beauty of the High Holidays is this recognition that we are not stagnant beings; we have the ability to move forward in a positive wav.

Hearing the shofar in South Africa also reminded Sherry that we are all part of a much larger community. On Rosh

Hashanah, Rabbi Harari talked about the movie "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" which is a heartwarming documentary about Fred Rogers. She talked about the importance of community and a neighborhood. We have been working to build our new neighborhood here at Shir Tikvah, one in which everyone can feel a sense of belonging as well as being comfortable, safe, and accepted.

Shir Tikvah has been in existence for about three months and during this period, much has been accomplished. Signing the Consolidation Agreement was just the beginning. To create our new entity, documents were filed with the state and we were informed at the end of June that Shir Tikvah, Song of Hope, now legally existed. Organizationally, our Executive Committee and Board of Directors have met and are actively governing. We have developed one new dues structure and combined our Mi Sheiberach and Yahrzeit lists. A new Shir Tikvah bank account has been opened, and we issue a monthly revenue and expense statement.

We have a new Shir Tikvah bulletin. Our Sisterhoods have combined as Women of Shir Tikvah, and we have hired a new choir director for the High Holidays, Justin Callis. While we have two ritual committees, Conservative and Reform, they are working closely together. As was recently mentioned in the bulletin, we will continue to do more together ritually. We celebrated Selichot services together and will have a combined break the fast tomorrow. While we have had occasional Shabbat kiddushes together, we will begin to do this every Shabbat.

We have established a new Transition Committee that will assist in consolidating our office operations and decorating our building with artifacts and memorabilia from both Am Echad and BYBS. We have installed new flooring throughout the building for improved safety and a brighter, fresher look. We have replaced the bimah floor, making it safer and have started on the upgrade of our sound system in the sanctuary and social hall. This will be finished in the next week.

But there is still much to be done. We need to design a new logo for Shir Tikvah. We need to plan our Fundraising

Programs for the year and start a Caring Committee. We will be painting in the halls, sanctuary and social hall and putting a seating area in where the gift shop used to be. So, there is a lot more to do and a lot to look forward to. What does membership in Shir Tikvah mean? Yes, it means that we have a place to go for Shabbat, Festival celebrations and High Holiday services. We have the knowledge, consul and caring from Rabbi Harari. We can participate in life cycle events, social programs and education classes. But, it also means that we are part of a caring family. We support each other in happy times and not so happy times. We are there to help each other with a ride to temple or to the doctor, with a cooked dinner when we are sick, with being part of a minyan or with just checking in on each other. We are fortunate to be part of the Shir Tikvah family.

When Sherry was in Zimbabwe, she was fortunate to have dinner with six young people, three of whom were Zimbabwean lawyers. During the course of the dinner, one of the lawyers asked another one this provocative question: "What have you done to give back to your community?" We would like to pose that question to you. Shir Tikvah is a new and vibrant organization. We manage our operations and finances responsibly. However, to operate our building and pay our staff and expenses, we need your support. Dues and our Kol Nidre Appeal are the major sources of revenue. This is the Kol Nidre Appeal part. We ask that you support Shir Tikvah to the best of your ability. Everyone is important, and all contributions are important. Nobody is ever turned away because he or she can't pay. Those of us who are able need to continue to support Shir Tikvah. Our budget is based on the consideration that everyone will give a total amount that is at or above the level the person gave last year. Think about how much you spend at Starbucks. If each person would donate an extra amount equal to the cost of one drink a week, we would have an additional \$45,000 to work with. Think about the building improvements that have been made and the programs that have been offered. Think about the times you have called the rabbi for help. Think about how important it is to you to have a vibrant

congregation in the south suburbs. Please send in your Kol Nidre Appeal card as soon as possible. If you already have, thank you. If you haven't yet, please do as soon as possible. If you need a card, please contact our office and we will be pleased to send you one. If you would like to contribute more than you pledged, we will also accept that.

Money is not the only way you can give back to our community. We also need people to donate time. If you are interested in being on a committee, please let us know. If you would like to help bake or serve or clean-up, please don't be afraid to participate. Participate—hmm—that is another way you can help. We need people to attend services and to attend minyans and to attend our social functions. In other words, we need you. In the documentary, Fred Rogers talks about the importance of tikkun olam, repairing the world. We can all heed the wake -up call of the shofar and start now to do our part in making this a better congregation, a better community, and a better place in the world.

Sherry and Sherman have a lot of people to thank. First and foremost, we thank our spouses, Ron and Ruth, who patiently keep saying okay to our serving one or two or three more years. We thank Rabbi Harari for her leadership and consul. Thank you to our boards who bring many years of dedicated service and wisdom and to all of our congregants who serve on committees and help out at services and social events. Of course, we cannot forget to thank Cathy, Diedre and Bob for keeping us operational.

There is also a significant amount of work during the year and for the High Holidays that keeps our services running smoothly. A big thank you to Carole and Janet, our ritual vice presidents, and to Gayle for her significant contributions behind the scenes. Thank you to Rabbi Harari, Rabbi Dreyfus, Rabbi Podwol, Dalia, Justin and our choir for the beautiful and inspirational High Holiday services.

Shir Tikvah is for all of us, and we hope to see you frequently at services, programs and social activities. From Ron and Sherry and from Sherman, Ruth, and Jonathan, A Happy, Healthy and Sweet year 5779.



The plan includes professional services of funeral



director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse/graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment for chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor* candle, *kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, *kpot* and 50 standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$6,400. For further details, call the Shir Tikvah office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it.


