Rabbi's Message

My father's parents were from Czechoslovakia. My grandfather, Ervin, was born and raised near the north of the country in a village called Czechske-Teshin. My grandmother, Judith, was born and raised in a village called Zborov, near the Hungarian border in the early part of the twentieth century. Although my grandfather died before I was born, I heard many a story about

him from my grandmother and from my father and uncle. And I know that though we never met, we share some things in common, most notably, a birthday. When my mother finally went into labor with me on October 26, 1977, my grandmother Judith lamented: "Couldn't you have waited just two more days? If you had, the baby would have been born on my late husband's birthday." Needless to say, my grandmother got her wish. Her eldest child became a parent to his eldest (and only) child on his late father's birthday. And since I

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Special Announcements and Calendars Pages 18-22 was the first grandchild to be born, this seemed especially significant. My grandfather would have been 70 years old on the day that I was born.

On October 28, 2019, I will celebrate my fortysecond birthday. And this year, as many of you know, I'll be spending my birthday on a flight from O'Hare International Airport to Warsaw, Poland. It is the city that will begin my ten-day tour of Ashkenazi Europe, also including Krakow, Budapest, and Prague. My grandparents didn't come from Prague, but I am told that as a young lawyer, my grandfather lived and practiced in the city, before choosing to make Aliyah, and to help build the then not even fledgling state of Israel. But there is something special about the opportunity to come as close as I ever have to my grandparents' birthplace. The opportunity to embrace my roots, to see where my grandfather might have walked, and a place that my grandmother might have visited. And it feels symbolic that I get to begin this journey on the very day that binds me to my grandfather, the 28th of October, our shared birthday.

During my trip, my rabbinic colleagues and I will visit Jewish Poland, the Jewish Czech Republic, and Jewish Hungary. There will be difficult but important sites to see, like the Warsaw Ghetto, Auschwitz -Birkenau, and Terezin. I feel especially honored to be able to bear witness to these places and to the atrocities that took place there. My grandparents were the lucky ones in their families; they got out just before Hitler came. Their relatives weren't so lucky... I eagerly anticipate this opportunity to celebrate Shabbat with the Progressive Jewish community in Krakow, and to experience the

synagogues, museums, and more which I will visit on this trip. I look forward to sharing what I learn with all of you.

And on this, my forty-second birthday, my wish is this: That if my grandfather Ervin is out there, somewhere, that he knows that I am going to learn more about his roots, and about my own. And that he knows how grateful I am for his decision to come to Palestine and to start a new life for himself. I wouldn't be here without him.

Presidents' Message

The following was the Kol Nidre Address 5780

L'shana Tova and welcome to 5780, our second year as Shir Tikvah. This is a season for reflection as we look to the past with thoughts of how to improve in the future. Last year at this time, we were moving forward, not with baby steps, but with giant leaps as we worked together to form our new congregation. During this time, Rabbi has challenged us to consider new ideas as we work toward improving our individual practices. During the High Holy Days services, we are repeatedly reminded that although G-d has inscribed a judgment against all who have sinned, it can be ameliorated through tesuvah or repentance, tefilah (prayer) and tzedakah. We think of tzedakah in terms of charity, but perhaps that is too limited a meaning. Let us look at some examples. Recently there has been a spate of Jewish-themed movies on streaming services. such as Netflix and Amazon. Two films which are based on true stories are "The Spy" and "The Red Sea Diving Resort." "The Spy" is based on the true story of Eli Cohen, an Israeli spy for the Mossad who infiltrated the Syrian government from 1961-1965. He ingratiated himself so much with the government that he supposedly was offered the job of Minister of Defense. He was able to tour the Syrian outposts on the Golan Heights and send information back to Israel. Cohen's suggestion to the Syrians to plant trees on the Golan Heights near each of their fortifications enabled the IDF to capture the Golan Heights in the Six Day War two years

after his death. Some of the achievements credited to him in the film may or may not be true (Hollywood, you know), but what is true is the fact that he knowingly risked his life to help Israel. On his last trip to Syria, he was discovered, tortured, and hung. Israel is still negotiating to have his body returned. To give a little perspective about the time in which this takes place, 1961 is only 15 years after the Holocaust, after WWII ended. Certainly, this time frame helped to affect people's decisions. "The Red Sea Diving Resort" is about another little-known Mossad activity: Operation Brothers. The Mossad ran a fake diving resort in the Sudan which they used as a cover to help Ethiopian Jews escape to Israel. The Mossad would visit Sudanese refugee camps, load up trucks with the Ethiopian Jews, drive them for hundreds of miles across the Sudan to the Arous Holiday Village. Gad Shimron played a key role in this operation at the risk of losing his life, but Shimron claimed that the real heroes were the Ethiopian Jews who endured more hardships to reach the land of Israel. Why did Cohen and Shimron and many others become involved in such risky situations? They did so because it was the right thing, the just thing, to do.

During the year, Rabbi Harari has emphasized that tzedakah is more than just giving money or time. She has stated that tzedakah is doing what is right or fair or just. As Lisa Katz wrote on February 21, 2019, "Tzedakah literally means righteousness in Hebrew. In the Bible, tzedakah is used to

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refer to justice, kindness, ethical behavior and the like. In post-biblical Hebrew, tzedakah refers to charity, giving to those in need." The dual translation of both justice and charity is consistent with Jewish thought as "Judaism considers charity to be an act of justice. Judaism holds that people in need have a legal right to food, clothing and shelter that must be honored by more fortunate people." Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, in his discussion on "Tzedakah: Love as Justice" states that there are two kinds of mitzvot: commands of self-restraint and the commands of love. Of the positive mitzvot of love, the greatest is tzedakah. Because the world is not equitable or fair, our job is to help make it more so. To be good is to do good. The act of tzedakah is an act that combines both justice and love. "Giving to others is one of the most beautiful things we can do, and one of the most creative. We create possibilities for other people. We soften some of the rough edges of the world. We help alleviate poverty and pain. We give God the sacrifice He most desires of us: that we honor His image in other people. Nothing more marks Judaism as a religion of love than its emphasis on tzedakah. We do not accept poverty, hunger, homelessness or disease as God's will. To the contrary, God's will is that we heal these fractures in His world. As God feeds the hungry, so must we. As God heals the sick, so must we. We become good by doing good. We walk in God's ways by acting out of love.

There is a fascinating feature of the geography of the land of Israel. It contains two seas: the Sea of Galilee and the Dead Sea. The Sea of Galilee is full of life: fish,

birds, vegetation. The Dead Sea, as its name implies, is not. Yet they are fed by the same river, the Jordan. The difference is that the Sea of Galilee receives water at one end and gives out water at the other. The Dead Sea receives but does not give. The Jordan ends there. To receive but not to give is, in Jewish geography as well as Jewish psychology, simply not life. To live is to give."

However, tzedakah is not merely a social act; it is a religious act, a duty that cannot be forsaken even by those who are themselves in need. We are taught that no matter how destitute we may be, there is someone who is in a worse condition. Again, as is stated in our liturgy, tzedakah is one of the three acts that gain us forgiveness from our sins. As copresident of Shir Tikvah, I stand up here tonight to ask you for your support; we ask you to give to the best of your ability. Shir Tikvah does not receive government or corporate support; we operate strictly from the monies obtained from dues and donations. We are a congregation that is open to every Jew, whether or not that person can afford to pay. However, we need the support of those who can to operate our building and pay our staff. Let us think about what you are getting for your support. Last year at this time, we talked about the building improvements that we planned on making. Since then, we have painted the halls, sanctuary, and social hall. We have put a new welcome area where the gift shop used to be. Our sound system has been improved. We have updated our security system, which was partially funded by a grant

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from JUF. We now have a sign with our new logo outside near each door which identifies us as Shir Tikvah. We even have a bench outside the main door for those who are waiting for rides. We have been listening to you and have followed up on your recommendations.

We have also had many activities during the year, so many in fact, that one of the best comments I heard is that there is too much going on. As we have grown as a congregation, we have become less of the CAE and BYBS identities and more of the Shir Tikvah identity. People have discovered that one of the many benefits of our congregation is that they can move back and forth between Reform and Conservative services. At times, we have come together for minyanim and holiday celebrations. Last year, for the first time, we came together at the end of Yom Kippur for Havdalah and to break fast. This was so successful, we are doing it again this year. Again, for the first time, we had home-hosted Selichot dinners, after which we came back here for services. With the help of the Women of Shir Tikvah, otherwise known as WoST, we have had social events and fund-raising events. Many of you have enjoyed the challahs that they sold this holiday season. There have been theater parties and birthday luncheons. This past winter was the Chanukah party and the jewelry sale. You all have received the first edition of the Shir Tikvah ad book. As you may have heard, Shir Tikvah is starting a religious school. It will kick off in mid-October and will be more than just a book studying experience. Our school will not be restricted by walls; it will be a hands-on and

learning by doing experience. We are fortunate to have numerous and talented educators in our congregation who have spent many hours developing the curriculum for our school. We are depending on volunteers to present the programs so some of you may be asked to volunteer to present a unit or lead an activity. As the year progresses, you will be invited to share in some of the life experiences of our students in the Shir Tikvah school.

As a work in progress, with your help, our congregation will continue to improve and grow. But we need your help. Please send in your Kol Nidre appeal card as soon as possible. If you have misplaced it, please contact Diedre and she will cheerfully send you another one. Please consider donating at or above the amount you did last year. If each family would increase the level of donation by only \$10 a month (or about \$0.35 a day), we would have an additional \$12,000 to use for your benefit. Think about how important it is for you to have a vibrant congregation in the south suburbs. Think about the times you have called upon the rabbi for help or upon the congregation for a yahrzeit minyan. Think about the times when you are not feeling well and the rabbi or a congregant checks in on you.

Money is not the only way you can donate. We need people to donate time, another precious commodity. Let us know what you can do. We need people to bake, people to set up or to clean up after events, people to give rides to others, people to make phone calls, people to visit the homebound.

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Together, we can continue to give meaning to Shir Tikvah, song of hope.

Sarah Hurwitz wrote an op-ed in The Wall Street Journal on Sept. 28 entitled "Religion for Adults Means Embracing Complexity." In it, she wrote, "...mature forms of religion don't traffic in simplistic or implausible answers, but push us to as the right questions. Not just 'what does it mean to be happy or successful?' But 'what does it mean to lead a truly ethical life? To be part of a community? To serve something greater than one's self?'

To find this kind of religion, we need to seek out—and if necessary, create—communities that embrace wise, loving versions of our faiths. We need to find clergy whose spiritual depth is matched by intellectual depth; who understand that path at its best is a form of protest against the self-absorption, materialism, triviality and cruelty of modern life; and who are comfortable uttering the phrase 'I don't know.'" We are so fortunate to have that here at Shir Tikvah with our understanding and compassionate congregants and with the leadership of Rabbi Harari and our rabbis emeriti: Rabbi Dreyfus, Rabbi Podwol, and Rabbi Wolkow.

With my co-president, I have a lot of people to thank. First and foremost, we thank our spouses, Ron and Ruth, who patiently supported us as we received and made phone calls, attended meetings, and took care of our other presidential duties. We thank Rabbi Harari for her leadership and consul. Thank you to our boards, who bring many years of dedicated service and wisdom, and to all of our congregants who serve on


committees and help out at services and social events. Of course, we cannot forget to thank Diedre and Bob for keeping us operational.

There is also a significant amount of work during the year and for the High Holidays that keeps our services running smoothly. A big thank you to Carole and Janet, our ritual vice presidents, and to Gayle for her significant contributions behind the scenes. Thank you to Rabbi Harari, Rabbi Dreyfus, Rabbi Podwol, Dalia, Justin and our choir for the beautiful and inspirational High Holiday services.







select this plan, simply call Chicago Jewish Funerals at 847-229-8822 and tell them that you are a Shir Tikvah member. They will handle all the details. The plan includes professional services of funeral director and staff, custodial and general care of remains, the option of a *tahara* (the traditional Jewish preparation of the body) a hearse graveside transfer vehicle, staff and equipment or chapel and a graveside or synagogue service. Merchandise includes a simple, dignified semi-oval traditional casket of dark stained wood, muslin shroud (optional, not mandatory), register book, shiva and *yizkor* candle, *kriah* ribbons, service folders, use of prayer books, kpot and 50 standard acknowledgement cards. The funeral price is \$6,400. For further details, call the Shir Tikvah office or Chicago Jewish Funerals. The plan is offered as a convenience for members and their families at a time of stress, but there is no obligation to use it.
