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## **Rabbi's Message**

This year, more than ever before, I will miss having Thanksgiving. After all, giving thanks is in our DNA. Rabbi Michael M. Cohen teaches, “The English word ‘Jew’ comes from the name of Judah, the fourth son of Leah and Jacob. Judah’s name in Hebrew is Yehudah, as we read in Genesis (29:35):

‘She became pregnant again and bore a son, and said, ‘This time I will give thanks to God.’ Therefore, she called his name Yehudah [‘giving thanks’]. We learn from this that one of the essential qualities of being Jewish is to live in a state of thanks...” And we learn in the Mishna, that a person must bless a bad situation just as a good one. Of course, with the topsy turvy state of the world, it might seem especially hard to give thanks this year. And so, I share with you a piece I shared in my sermon for the South Suburban Interfaith Thanksgiving service in 2016. It is an upside-down poem, written by then 11th grader Chanie Gorkin. Reflecting on the state of the world, this young woman wrote a poem that can be read both ways. Just as most days this year, we feel as expressed in the poem, read from top to bottom, our inclination to live in a state of gratitude, to give thanks in spite of everything, allows

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us to, none-the-less, turn things upside down. Even in the midst-of anger, fear, and heartache, we can find a ray of light in the darkness. As we prepare for a communal day of Thanksgiving in our country, I invite you to remember that even when things feel top to bottom, there is also a bottom to top. Read this poem as written, then read it again from end to beginning. Things are never as clear as they seem, and everything can be seen from another perspective. In-spite-of everything, give thanks this year; for your life, God-willing, for your health, for your family, friends, and community, and for anything and everything you have. I hope it will help lift your spirits and remind us that we're all in this together.

I give thanks for all of you and for the ways in which you've been a blessing in my life.

## President's Message

The fall season is upon us, as the leaves change colors, and the temperatures drop. This year was a unique year, as the High Holiday services were held online. We did our best to ensure all our members were able to attend the service either by computer, tablet, or phone. I hope everyone who wanted to attend was able to do so. For those who attended, I hope everyone found the online services fulfilling. It was, surely, a learning experience for all of us.

We would have preferred to attend the services in the synagogue, but the online version allowed for some advantages. We had attendees from coast to coast, including Rabbi and Dalia Podwol from California. We had many members who were joined by their children who attended from distant locations. We were able to join the Conservative and Reform members for a live Yizkor service with everyone attending the same Zoom broadcast. The Yizkor service had over one hundred Zoom accounts logged on.

The Conservative services were broadcast live over Zoom. Rabbi Harari lead the services and there were very few technical difficulties. The Reform service was taped in advance except for the Yizkor and the Ne'ilah, the final Yom Kippur afternoon service, which were live. The services were led by Rabbi Zukrow, who retired from Beth El in Munster. There were some technical issues with the pre-recorded services, mostly in the editing of the services. I do apologize for the glitches in the services. We realize the editing and review needed additional attention. I also apologize to members whose pre-recorded portion did not make it into the service.

We learned a lot and will be better prepared if we need to do this again, although, I pray we will be in person for services next year. The pre-recorded format did allow for some nice surprises. On the eve of Yom Kippur, we played a recording of Temple B'nai Yehuda's beloved Cantor Henry Altman's famous Kol Nidre. We

also saw pre-recorded stories from some of our members about their journeys to America. Thank you to Chuck Stone for his efforts recording an oral history of many of our members.

During the week between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, Rabbi Harari, Rabbi Zukrow and Rabbi Podwol each hosted an online study session. On the morning of Rosh Hashanah Rabbi Zukrow and Rabbi Dreyfus led a discussion of the Rosh Hashanah Torah portion.

I want to thank all the people who helped prepare the High Holiday services and all the members who participated in the services. It was a new experience for almost everyone, and your efforts are very much appreciated.

As we move past the High Holidays, we need to look for ways to keep our community involved. While we cannot meet in person, we will look for ways to stay connected. October has been a busy month. There were several events in addition to Sukkot and Simchat Torah.

We have made an exception to our policy to allow in person services for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. The attendance is limited to close family. Everyone in attendance must adhere to our COVID19 building policy. We had Grant Goldberg's Bar Mitzvah in August and now we have had two Bar Mitzvah's in October. Damien Munson's Bar Mitzvah was October 17 and Chuko Akujieze's Bar Mitzvah was October 24. These were on Zoom, hosted by Larry Burrows, and thanks to some of our younger members, Aaron Latman and Louie Bloomberg who handled the filming. Mazel Tov to all the families celebrating a Bar Mitzvah this year.

Our school started Sunday and Hebrew classes online in September. Following Sukkot, the Hebrew School held classes outside at the prayer circle behind the parking lot. Each family then took turns going into the Sukkah to shake the lulav and etrog. It was a nice opportunity

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for the children and parents to get together, outside and have some fun, while social distancing.

The following day was a busy day in the Shir Tikvah parking lot. The Shir Tikvah parking lot was a collection site for a JUF Tikkun Olam Volunteer (TOV) sponsored a drive to collect hygiene toiletries for Respond Now. JUF/TOV collected 110 kits and supplies from 55 participants. The South Suburban Cooperative Jewish Council (CJC) set up a table to distribute challahs that were ordered as part of the joint CJC Sabbath service that Friday. NCJW also was on hand to distribute their membership directory. Many people stayed to talk and enjoy the fall weather. The day was a nice afternoon of social distancing, with masks on and much needed social interaction.

The South Suburban CJC held a joint online Sabbath service. The service was hosted by Temple Anshe Shalom (TAS) and conducted by Rabbi Isaacs from TAS, Rabbi Harari, and Rabbi Kuvin from Joliet Jewish Congregation. Over one hundred Zoom accounts were logged on for the service. The service went very well, and members enjoyed time to chat following the service.

Learning something new is recommended to stay sharp. I have become the Zoom host for our adult education events, and I have learned quite a bit. We have had two events that have been well received. In July, Professor Kwall discussed ways to adapt traditional religious practices to perpetuate Judaism for future generations. In September, Jessica Schaffer, director of HIAS Immigration and Citizenship, part of JCFS Chicago's family of services, provided an interesting look into policies impacting refugees, asylum seekers and DACAmented individuals today. I found both to be remarkably interesting and was glad I invested time in attending.

The next event supported with a JUF mini grant will be Sunday November 8 at 10AM on Zoom. Jane Shapiro will explore a few characters—men and women— learning how they became leaders

through different pathways and roles. Jane Shapiro has been a teacher to many over the last thirty years, in classes ranging from weekly Torah study to Jewish thought, history and literature. Log on and learn something new.

November brings the Kristallnacht observance. Remembering Kristallnacht continues a long tradition for Shir Tikvah with many members whose families immigrated to America from Nazi Germany. This year we will host a Kabbalat Shabbat service, including a special remembrance of Kristallnacht, as well as a presentation by Rabbi Harari about her trip to Europe, including Poland, The Czech Republic, and Hungary.

The Fundraising Committee will be working on the annual Membership Directory and Ad Book. If you are interested in joining the committee, please contact Ruth Friedman. This is one of the fundraising activities possible during the pandemic. We encourage members to place a personal ad and to solicit an advertisement from a local vendor you frequent.

An interfaith Thanksgiving service is planned for November 25. There are several events planned in the coming months, in addition to the regular Sabbath Services, Tuesday's Oneg and Friday's Candle Lighting and Kaddish. Check the calendar and watch for Zoom links in the Shir Tikvah weekly email notice. Although events and services are not in person, you can see friends and there is always time to talk before or after the event. I look forward to seeing you on Zoom. **General Rules**

Face mask must be properly worn inside the building. This means covering the mouth and nose area with support straps around the ears. A mask will be provided if you do not have one. No one will be allowed to enter the building without a properly worn face mask.

Practice social distancing when in the building. Maintain at least six feet distance between people not living in the same household.

Hand sanitizer should be used on entering the building and as needed.

**Sanctuary will only be used for Bar/Bat Mitzvah services. Maximum capacity 25**

All guests must be registered with the Shir Tikvah office at least five days before the event.

Upon arrival at Shir Tikvah, all attendees must complete a COVID-19 questionnaire. If any answers indicate a potential risk, admission to the building will be denied.

Do not congregate by the entrance, foyer, or hallway. After entry, individuals should proceed immediately to seats to avoid congregating.

Only sit with people within your household. `

Sanctuary doors will remain open for improved air flow and to avoid unnecessary contact.

No handshaking or hugging.

Prayer books can be picked up at the book cart by the front sanctuary doors. These books have not been used for at least two weeks. After the service, please return the books to the same cart, so they can be isolated for a proper period.

No Choir until further notice.

**Restrooms**

Only one person should use the restroom at a time.

If a line forms near the restroom, please remain six feet from each other in the main hallway.

**Office**

If you need to enter the building, please contact Diedre prior to coming to the building. She can ensure she will be there for your visit and we can control the number of visitors in the building.

Upon entering the building, please sign into the logbook in the foyer and sign out when exiting. This will allow us to track all individuals who have been in the building.

Rabbi Harari and Diedre are the only people allowed in the offices. If you need to communicate with them, please do it from the hallway.

**Kitchen** - No food service will be allowed in the building.

## Facility Re-Opening Committee

There has not been much change to the status of the re-opening since last month. The office is open if you need to borrow a prayer book or drop something off. We have developed a Covid19 policy for those entering the building. The policy is on page 6. If you need to enter the building, please follow the rules.

We want to minimize the number of visitors to our building. If you are required to come to the office, please email or call Diedre so she can schedule your visit. When in the building, please record your time in and out in the logbook in the foyer. This will allow us to track who has been in the building.

**Please wear a face mask, practice social distancing, and use the hand sanitizer stationed in the hallway.**

Currently, we do not feel it is safe to begin in person

services or meeting. Therefore, there are no changes to our status planned. We will make an exception to use the synagogue for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. On October 17, DJ Munson became Bar Mitzvah in the synagogue with limited family attending and following the policy, as well as Chuko Akujiezie on October 24th. Mazel Tov to these families!

This is the status until conditions with the virus change. Please join us on Zoom for weekly services and other events. If you need assistance with Zoom, please contact Diedre so we can assist you. Please be safe and stay healthy.

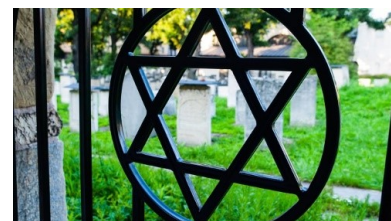
