Rabbi's Message

Chanukah is the Festival of Lights and light is the symbol of hope. How important hope is to have right now, especially as the year draws to a close and the chill and darkness of winter set in. Although it is even tougher to have hope in these conditions, our tradition, like so many others, reminds us that even in the darkest of times, there will be light to illumine the way forward. A debate between Hillel and Shammai is recounted in the

Talmud. Shammai suggests that the Chanukah menorah should be lit beginning with eight candles on the first night of the holiday, and a candle should be taken away each subsequent night. If this sounds rather odd to us now, it is because we have adopted the candle lighting method suggested by Hillel: Begin with one candle on the first night, and then, each subsequent night, add a candle so that by the last night of the festival, eight candles shine bright. The idea here is that on each night of Chanukah we increase the light and the joy. It is this aspect of the holiday upon which I'd like to invite you to focus this year: Increasing light and joy! This year, I invite you to find unique and creative ways to

President's Message

I hope everyone had a healthy and happy Thanksgiving. Fall is upon us and we celebrated another holiday during the pandemic. As we continue to live with the virus, this Thanksgiving was different than those before it. For the first time, only three of my family were together and we ordered out a turkey dinner with the traditional sides. Luckily, we have Zoom and Facetime to stay in touch with our families.

As the temperatures begin to drop, Chanukah will be here soon. Chanukah begins the evening of December 10 and we have several events planned for the holiday.

The first event is an Erev Shabbat Chanukah service on Friday, Dec. 11 hosted by the Joliet Jewish Congregation (JJC). Rabbi Kuvin (JJC) has created a service with music and a description of how Chanukah is celebrated in 21 different countries. Children from both congregations' schools will participate in the service. It is beneficial to develop a relationship with the Joliet Jewish Congregation. They joined Shir Tikvah last month for our Kristallnacht observation.

On Sunday December 13, we are, again, working with JUF-TOV with our parking lot serving as a drop spot for their next community-wide collection drive. The event, Nourish Our Neighborhoods: Winter

Gear will be held on Sunday from noon to 1:30PM. TOV is collecting kits with winter necessities of gloves, scarves, hats, and handwarmers. Please check your emails for details to participate in this much needed service.

Later in the day, the CJC will be hosting a virtual Chanukah party at 7:00PM. Together, over Zoom, we will light the Chanukah candles, sing your favorite Chanukah songs, and engage in a debate of earth-shattering significance – The Latke-Hamantaschen Debate. We thought since Chanukah is a celebration, it would be fun to do something for the whole family. The challahs were a big hit at the last CJC event, so this time there will be latkes for those who sign up early.

The final event is on Thursday December 17 at 7:30PM, the last night of Chanukkah. This is a Chanukah program with Kol Emet in Palo Alto, CA. Our members, Lloyd and Risa Graff's daughter is the Rabbi at Kol Emet. Kol Emet has put together a program called IllumiNations to celebrate the last night of Chanukah with a communal lighting of the candles along with entertainment. The highlight will be celebrating the 8th night of Chanukah (virtually) with fellow Jews in all 50 states!

We hope you can take part in these activities. We recognize virtual events cannot replace the togetherness of meeting in person. This presents a challenge to the congregation to maintain our community and provide needed services to our members. This is especially hard on those who are restricted to home or limited in the ability to be around others. We have, therefore, created a Caring Committee to provide a line of communication with our members.

The purpose of the Caring Committee is to keep in touch with members and build a sense of community and belonging. The committee will make phone calls to members who are in need of personal contact. The calls are of a social nature, to make sure the members feel a part of the Shir Tikvah community, and their pastoral needs are being met. I am grateful to Eila Koltun for volunteering to Chair the Caring Committee. If you would be interested in being a part of the committee and make phone calls, please contact Eila. If you would like to receive a phone call from another member, please contact Eila or Diedre at the office. We hope this committee will help keep all our members in touch with Shir Tikvah during these trying times.

Fundraising is also challenging during the pandemic. We are moving forward to publish the Shir Tikvah Membership Directory and Ad Book. The Ad Book has been the largest fundraiser for the last few years. Last year, the Ad Book received \$10,000 in ads and honorary support which resulted in \$9,350 for Shir Tikvah after printing costs. The revenue was split evenly between personal ads from members and business ads.

Each year, as part of the Ad Book, we honor a member or members for their service to our community. This year we are honoring our congregants who developed our Virtual High Holiday Services. This was a great effort and enabled our congregation to be able to participate in High Holiday services. The congregants are: Ritual Vice-President, Carole

Fefferman; Ritual Vice-President, Janet Herbstman; WoST President, Gayle Weil; Dan Greenberg and Larry Burrows. We honor and thank them for the many hours spent making the High Holiday services so special. The cost to add your name to the special support page is \$18.

To support Shir Tikvah, you can buy a personal ad. The ads can celebrate families-children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, life cycle events or in memory of a loved one. Ads run from \$45 for a quarter page to \$130 for a full page. The forms to pledge support for the honorees or to purchase a personal ad have been mailed to all members.

The forms also include a letter for soliciting an ad from a local business that you frequent. I know many people do not feel comfortable asking for a donation. I have found that asking local business owners I personally know are receptive to the idea. This includes barber/hair salon, doctor/dentist, insurance agent, investment advisor, restaurant, or small business owner. Business ads help to generate income from outside our membership.

As we celebrate the miracle of Chanukah, let us hope the vaccines will be the light at the end of the tunnel of this pandemic. Until then we will continue planning virtual events for the coming winter months. Together we will get through this difficult time.

Building Use Policy During COVID-19

Effective July 15, 2020

General Rules

Face mask must be properly worn inside the building. This means covering the mouth and nose area with support straps around the ears. A mask will be provided if you do not have one. No one will be allowed to enter the building without a properly worn face mask.

Practice social distancing when in the building. Maintain at least six feet distance between people not living in the same household.

Hand sanitizer should be used on entering the building and as needed.

Sanctuary will only be used for Bar/Bat Mitzvah services. Maximum capacity 25

All guests must be registered with the Shir Tikvah office at least five days before the event.

Upon arrival at Shir Tikvah, all attendees must complete a COVID-19 questionnaire. If any answers indicate a potential risk, admission to the building will be denied.

Do not congregate by the entrance, foyer, or hallway. After entry, individuals should proceed immediately to seats to avoid congregating.

Only sit with people within your household. `

Sanctuary doors will remain open for improved air flow and to avoid unnecessary contact.

Facility Re-Opening Committee

There has not been much change to the status of the re-opening since last month. The office is open if you need to borrow a prayer book or drop something off. We have developed a Covid19 policy for those entering the building. The policy is on page 6. If you need to enter the building, please follow the rules.

We want to minimize the number of visitors to our building. If you are required to come to the office, please email or call Diedre so she can schedule your visit. When in the building, please record your time in and out in the logbook in the foyer. This will allow us to track who has been in the building.

Please wear a face mask, practice social distancing, and use the hand sanitizer stationed in the hallway.

No handshaking or hugging.

Prayer books can be picked up at the book cart by the front sanctuary doors. These books have not been used for at least two weeks. After the service, please return the books to the same cart, so they can be isolated for a proper period.

No Choir until further notice.

Restrooms

Only one person should use the restroom at a time.

If a line forms near the restroom, please remain six feet from each other in the main hallway.

Office

If you need to enter the building, please contact Diedre prior to coming to the building. She can ensure she will be there for your visit and we can control the number of visitors in the building.

Upon entering the building, please sign into the logbook in the foyer and sign out when exiting. This will allow us to track all individuals who have been in the building.

Rabbi Harari and Diedre are the only people allowed in the offices. If you need to communicate with them, please do it from the hallway.

Kitchen - No food service will be allowed in the building.

Currently, we do not feel it is safe to begin in person services or meeting. Therefore, there are no changes to our status planned. We will make an exception to use the synagogue for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

This is the status until conditions with the virus change. Please join us on Zoom for weekly services and other events. If you need assistance with Zoom, please contact Diedre so we can assist you. Please be safe and stay healthy.

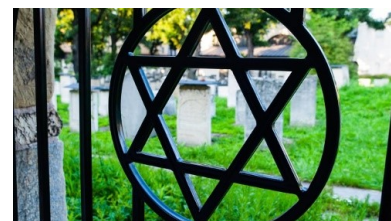

We held our first Parent Meeting and received great suggestions. One is to create a dedicated email for school business. Shir Tikvah President Jerry Tenny and computer maven Irwin Friedman are helping to implement.

Hebrew classes resumed on Wednesday December 2. Carole also began a Thursday Beginning Hebrew class on December 3 at 4:30-5:30. The Rabbi is


working on the Excel spreadsheet, provided by parent Robin Latman, with the prayers needed for B'nei Mitzvah. The next school Shabbat service is Saturday December 5th, a Reform service, at 10:15. Classes will end December 12 for Winter Break.

Sunday School restarted virtually for both 5th-6th graders and the new 7-9th graders, taught by Sherry Dieckman, on December 6 from 10-11:30. The final project for the Jewish Foods unit will be a non-secret family-recipe Sunday School cookbook which includes the bagel /bially recipe. On December 6th, all Sunday School classes will meet together on one zoom; Shir Tikvah members will share their immigration stories. On December 13th, both Sunday school classes will talk about Chanukah Around the World and share their own traditions. The final activity, with bagel baker Donelle Macey, will be the decorating of Hanukkah cookies sold by Shir Tikvah. Classes will end December 14 for Winter Break.

FYI: according to the Jewish Daily Forward. "Chanukah" comes closest to representing the pronunciation of the Hebrew word, while "Hanukkah" accurately recreates the Hebrew spelling. "All the other spellings—Hanuka, Hannukah, Chanukkah and so on—are simply guesswork or jazz improvisation." The South Florida Reporter says there are 16 ways to spell Hanukkah, since Hanukkah is transliterated from Hebrew letters. The most common in English are "Hanukkah" or "Chanukah."

However one spells it, have a wonderful Holiday!
