Rabbi's Message

There is an expression in Hebrew, a wish for Rosh HaShanah: תכלה שנה וקללותיה, תחל

May the old year and its curses come to an end, and the new year and its blessings begin.

These wishes, respectively, appear in a piyyut, a medieval song, often recited in synagogue on Rosh HaShanah, and have become well known and well-used among Israelis, religious

and secular alike. In the Babylonian Talmud, the sages explain that the first of the wishes relates to the reading of curses from the Torah:

It is taught in a baraita: Rabbi Shimon ben Elazar said: Ezra enacted for the Jewish people that they should read the portion of the curses that are recorded in Leviticus before Shavuot and the portion of the curses that are recorded in Deuteronomy before Rosh HaShana. The Gemara asks: What is the reason for this? Abaye said, and some say that it was Reish Lakish who said: In order that the year may conclude together with its

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curses, and the new year may begin without the ominous reading of the curses. (BT Megilot 31b)

The Academy of the Hebrew Language notes that the words תחל, and תחל, begin, have a similar sound. This, they suggest, makes for an especially pleasant saying. And on its website, the Academy notes its appreciation for the idea of leaving a previous year's curses behind as a new year begins. I, too, appreciate this idea. But I must confess that I believe that this year, there may be some value in remembering the curses. By no means do I mean that we should dwell on those things that brought us so much pain and suffering this year, but I do think that some of the curses that accompanied us throughout 2020, may not be as time-bound as others. The pandemic will come to an end and life will yet resume some sense of normalcy, but the evils of racism, division, and Anti-Semitism, are just a few of the curses that were here long before 2020 and will, sadly, be with us long after it ends.

Six months ago, our nation was ravaged by grief over the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery. Then riots broke out in Minneapolis and spread throughout the country. In October and November, politics divided us even further, and all these are things worth remembering - even if they bring pain; even in - spite - of it. We would do well to learn the lessons of these curses, to remember what happens when we live our lives in such a way as to cause pain to another human being. The curse of baseless hatred will not disappear until we step up and do something to change the way we act toward one another. The curse of racism will always be with us unless we do our part to acknowledge our privilege, to learn from the past, and to change the future.

We are taught in the Mishna: It is not upon you to complete the task, but neither are you free to desist from it. (Pirkei Avot 2:16). Sage advice for such a year as we have just concluded. My wish for all of us is this: May the curses we can't control leave us along with the year that has passed and may the blessing of the new year begin. But, in-light-of the year that has just ended, may we find ourselves ever-conscious of the curses that still surround us, and do everything in our power to bring them to an end. May this new year, 2021, inspire us to work toward peace, safety, health, and blessing for all!

For Purim we have planned a virtual ice-cream social (bring your own ice-cream!) and megillah reading- all on erev Purim, Thursday, February 25 at 7PM. Rabbi Harari will include parts in English and Hebrew for those who wish to participate. Please contact the office if you are interested in participating. Zoom will be open at 6:30 for people to visit before the megillah reading. We encourage people to dress up and have noise makers.

Purim was always one of my favorite holidays as a child. Making loud noise with a grogger whenever Haman is mentioned during the reading of the Megillah, eating hamantaschen and attending the Sunday School Purim carnival. As a child, I remember trying to win the big prize, a goldfish swimming around in a plastic baggy. As an adult I took my kids to the carnival and, again, came





On Sunday January 10, the 5-6th graders had Sunday School with a remote shaliach (emissary) from Israel; Rabbi Gidon Isaacs and Mindy Miller from Munster, Indiana invited our school to share in this CJC mini grant program. Arkady Hasidovich, who lives near Haifa, focused on Tu B'Shevat, Israel, Nature, and Innovation (like drip irrigation invented by Israelis and a locust protein bar). He will give us an Israeli Boot Camp experience February 14. The virtual NYC Tenement Museum field trip gave our students, parents, and teachers a wonderful experience seeing Jewish life 100 years ago. Other Sundays honored Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Jews who participated in the civil rights movement and a discussion of Maimonides' 8 Levels of Tzedakah with designs for futuristic tzedakah boxes.

After a restful Winter Break, Wednesday Hebrew School returned January 6, and the Thursday Beginning Hebrew School restarted January 7. Carole continued to work on prayers for Shabbat services and Tu B'Shevat activities.

Our students participated and did an excellent job at the Conservative service on January 9. The next service is Reform on February 13 at 10:15.

Building Use Policy During COVID-19 Effective July 15, 2020

General Rules

Face mask must be properly worn inside the building. This means covering the mouth and nose area with support straps around the ears. A mask will be provided if you do not have one. No one will be allowed to enter the building without a properly worn face mask.

Practice social distancing when in the building. Maintain at least six feet distance between people not living in the same household.

Hand sanitizer should be used on entering the building and as needed.

Sanctuary will only be used for Bar/Bat Mitzvah services. Maximum capacity 25

All guests must be registered with the Shir Tikvah office at least five days before the event.

Upon arrival at Shir Tikvah, all attendees must complete a COVID-19 questionnaire. If any answers indicate a potential risk, admission to the building will be denied.

Do not congregate by the entrance, foyer, or hallway. After entry, individuals should proceed immediately to seats to avoid congregating.

Only sit with people within your household. `Sanctuary doors will remain open for improved air flow and to avoid unnecessary contact.

No handshaking or hugging.

Prayer books can be picked up at the book cart by the front sanctuary doors. These books have not been used for at least two weeks. After the service, please return the books to the same cart, so they can be isolated for a proper period.

No Choir until further notice.

Restrooms

Only one person should use the restroom at a time. If a line forms near the restroom, please remain six feet from each other in the main hallway.

Office

If you need to enter the building, please contact Diedre prior to coming to the building. She can ensure she will be there for your visit and we can control the number of visitors in the building.

Upon entering the building, please sign into the logbook in the foyer and sign out when exiting. This will allow us to track all individuals who have been in the building.

Rabbi Harari and Diedre are the only people allowed in the offices. If you need to communicate with them, please do it from the hallway.

Kitchen - No food service will be allowed in the building.

Facility Re-Opening Committee

There has not been much change to the status of the re-opening since last month. The office is open if you need to borrow a prayer book or drop something off. We have developed a Covid19 policy for those entering the building. The policy is on page 6. If you need to enter the building, please follow the rules.

We want to minimize the number of visitors to our building. If you are required to come to the office, please email or call Diedre so she can schedule your visit. When in the building, please record your time in and out in the logbook in the foyer. This will allow us to track who has been in the building.

Please wear a face mask, practice social distancing, and use the hand sanitizer stationed in the hallway.

Currently, we do not feel it is safe to begin in person services or meeting. Therefore, there are no changes to our status planned. We will make an exception to use the synagogue for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

This is the status until conditions with the virus change. Please join us on Zoom for weekly services and other events. If you need assistance with Zoom, please contact Diedre so we can assist you. Please be safe and stay healthy.
