It's hard to believe that it has been more than a year since we first heard the words Coronavirus or COVID-19. The pandemic has wreaked havoc on all our lives; it has quite literally changed the way that we function. For some, the experience has been downright torturous, while for others, it's been more manageable. But even if we're feeling okay, even if we think we've got this new routine down, this past year has taken a toll on us all. Many of us have experienced the loss of loved ones in the last year and were unable to

mourn as we might have otherwise because of health restrictions. Others have struggled with loneliness, isolation, depression, and the like. Some of us have lost jobs or have been furloughed, leaving us scrambling for money to buy groceries or pay bills. And some of us have been pulling double duty, parenting children and unexpectedly, serving as home-school teachers. COVID has taken its toll on us all, and though we may feel too burned out, tired, or fed-up to take on one more thing, I'm here to tell you that now, more than ever, is the time for self-care.

Undoubtedly, self-care is one of the hardest things for most of us to achieve. We can't find the time, let alone the energy, to do something just for us. We're kind people, who care about others, and so we tend to put their needs before ours, and then we find all kinds of reasons why we and our needs matter far less. But, as we're told every time we get on an airplane: Put on your own oxygen mask first before helping others. There is 'Parenting During the Pandemic,' a workshop with a JCFS Parent Educator to discuss the challenges parents are facing and to hear about how they can manage the stressors and celebrate the joys of parenting during the pandemic. There is a workshop to help adults who are assisting someone struggling with a mental health condition, and there is a workshop aimed at building resilience. There are career services, volunteer opportunities, and programs for all ages. And these are only a few of the resources available to us through JCFS.

This past year has had an impact upon us all. Even if you're feeling okay, or even excited to get vaccinated and to get back into the world, now is the time to do something for yourself. JCFS has something for everyone; you don't have to be in the midst of a crisis or a struggle to take advantage of their workshops, support groups, and other resources. And you don't even have to leave home! Through the blessings of Zoom, you can attend a program or speak with one of their professionals from the comfort of your own living room. Our donations to the Jewish Federation help fund the work of JCFS. And now, when we need it most, JCFS is here to help us! I encourage you to take a look at the wonderful resources available to us, free of charge, that can truly help to build up our spirits and make it through what will, God-willing, be the last months of this pandemic.

President's Message

On March 9, 2020, we celebrated Purim as a community inside our building. Little did we know that it would be the last holiday celebration we would have inside the building for over a year. We were filled with the "what ifs?" and "don't knows." Committees met to decide what to do about services, about religious school, about closing the building, about conducting business. Decisions had to be made quickly. For example, Passover would soon be here. What about the services? What about the Community Seder? At first, we thought that the building would be open by the summer, but then we realized it would not. We learned how to use Zoom and started planning for the High Holidays. The ritual committee started meeting frequently as we realized how difficult the planning would be. What about the people who do not have computers? How do we teach people to use Zoom? How do we plan for both Conservative and Reform services? Are we allowed to use computers for the High Holiday services? During the summer as we worked on these questions, other questions arose. What about b'nai mitzvah? How will we hold school in the fall? How do we meet the varied needs of the congregants and remain in touch with everyone? Many, many thanks to Rabbi Harari and the committee members who helped us try to find the answers.

During this past year, we have learned much and have remained together as a community. Each and every one of you has enabled us to continue to function and has tolerated the missteps that happen as one is in a new environment. Indeed, this has been a difficult year, but as my friend often says, "Good things can come from bad if we just patiently wait." Perhaps most importantly, we have been able to connect with people around the world, to make new friends, and, in some cases, to find new family members. During the winter, especially during this snowy February, people who would not be able to attend services were

able to join us. We have had people from coast to coast, from California to New York, who sang with us (but in a muted way), prayed with us, and chatted with us at the end of each service. We lit candles together each Friday night as we welcomed the Sabbath. As the year went on, we were able to learn together with our guest speakers, thanks to the mini-grants. We even had drive-in movies during the nice weather. Eventually, we were able to open the building for the Rabbi, Diedre, and Bob so that more work could be done. We continued to have our virtual meetings with almost perfect attendance. And now that this year has passed, we have started to look to the future.

There are still many questions to be answered. When and how will we be able to open for services? This is a complex, nuanced issue with several ramifications. Our reopening committee and Board are currently dealing with this. How will we hold High Holiday services? Hopefully, as the weather consistently becomes more spring-like, we have talked about some outdoor activities. And, of course, what kind of social events will we have? As we look forward with hope, let us consider what Rabbi Avi Shafran noted in his essay, "My Father's Passover—and Ours" in the March 26th issue of The Wall Street Journal: "All of us, Jewish or not, no matter our problems, have experienced countless miracles and wonders. We may not always recognize divine guidance and benevolence or even appreciate the wonder of every beat of our hearts and every breath that fills our lungs. Thinking about the past year, though, we should."

Building Use Policy During COVID-19

Effective July 15, 2020

General Rules

Face mask must be properly worn inside the building. This means covering the mouth and nose area with support straps around the ears. A mask will be provided if you do not have one. No one will be allowed to enter the building without a properly worn face mask.

Practice social distancing when in the building. Maintain at least six feet distance between people not living in the same household.

Hand sanitizer should be used on entering the building and as needed.

Sanctuary will only be used for Bar/Bat Mitzvah services. Maximum capacity 25

All guests must be registered with the Shir Tikvah office at least five days before the event.

Upon arrival at Shir Tikvah, all attendees must complete a COVID-19 questionnaire. If any answers indicate a potential risk, admission to the building will be denied.

Do not congregate by the entrance, foyer, or hallway. After entry, individuals should proceed immediately to seats to avoid congregating.

Only sit with people within your household. `

Sanctuary doors will remain open for improved air flow and to avoid unnecessary contact.

Facility Re-Opening Committee

There has not been much change to the status of the re-opening since last month. The office is open if you need to borrow a prayer book or drop something off. We have developed a Covid19 policy for those entering the building. See above. If you need to enter the building, please follow the rules.

We want to minimize the number of visitors to our building. If you are required to come to the office, please email or call Diedre so she can schedule your visit. When in the building, please record your time in and out in the logbook in the foyer. This will allow us to track who has been in the building.

Please wear a face mask, practice social distancing, and use the hand sanitizer stationed in the hallway.

No handshaking or hugging.

Prayer books can be picked up at the book cart by the front sanctuary doors. These books have not been used for at least two weeks. After the service, please return the books to the same cart, so they can be isolated for a proper period.

No Choir until further notice.

Restrooms

Only one person should use the restroom at a time.

If a line forms near the restroom, please remain six feet from each other in the main hallway.

Office

If you need to enter the building, please contact Diedre prior to coming to the building. She can ensure she will be there for your visit and we can control the number of visitors in the building.

Upon entering the building, please sign into the logbook in the foyer and sign out when exiting. This will allow us to track all individuals who have been in the building.

Rabbi Harari and Diedre are the only people allowed in the offices. If you need to communicate with them, please do it from the hallway.

Kitchen - No food service will be allowed in the building.

Currently, we do not feel it is safe to begin in person services or meeting. Therefore, there are no changes to our status planned. We will make an exception to use the synagogue for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

This is the status until conditions with the virus change. Please join us on Zoom for weekly services and other events. If you need assistance with Zoom, please contact Diedre so we can assist you. Please be safe and stay healthy.

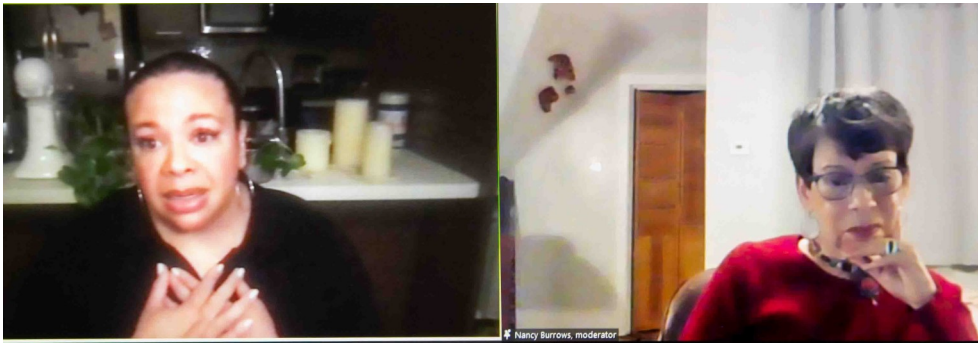

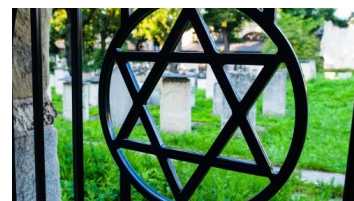

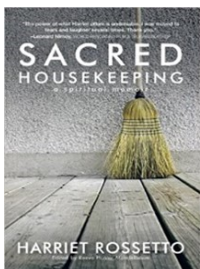
Temple Anshe Sholom Presents
Sacred Housekeeping with Harriet Rossetto
April 25 at 7:00 PM via Zoom

Come hear the inspiring story of Harriet Rossetto's life – how a “nice Jewish girl” embraced her rebel spirit and co-founded what would become a ground-breaking institution for addiction recovery. Along the way she developed the idea of “sacred housekeeping.” She will talk about this approach to living a healthier, more grounded life. Join us and learn how to foster an appreciation of the sacred world by doing the “work of life” – the mundane tasks of everyday living - more consciously, with awareness, and intention.



Harriet Rossetto is a social worker with a strong Jewish identity, Harriet answered what would be a life-altering classified ad in the Los Angeles Times looking for "a person of a Jewish background to help incarcerated Jewish offenders." Harriet soon recognized that most of the Jews in jail committed crimes as a by-product of what she's coined the "disease" of addiction. Frustrated by the lack of resources, she embraced the unpopular cause, fighting the widespread denial that "nice Jewish men and women" could be addicts and criminals in need of rehabilitation. A woman of passion, vision, and action, this fight took on the form of Beit T'Shuvah: The House of Return.
