Rabbi's Message

(D'var Torah delivered on Shabbat, eighth day of Pesach)

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, z'l, tells the story of Sir Moses Montefiore, who was once asked by someone how much he was worth. Montefiore thought for a moment and then replied with a sum of some hundreds of thousands of pounds. "C'mon," said the man, "I know you're worth millions. Why did you tell me you're only worth a few hundred thousand pounds?" And Montefiore replied, "You did not ask me how much I owned, you asked how much I'm worth, and



that is the sum that I have given to t'zdakah for far this year. Because", he said, "we are worth what we are willing to share with others."

I find this statement truly inspirational! Of course, as we know, t'zdakah, which is at the heart of our Torah reading this morning, is obligated. Perhaps because there are those whose hearts may not so move them, to borrow language from parashat t'rumah, or there are those, who might not be willing to share as Sir Moses Montefiore did in his lifetime. In fact, parashat Re'eh makes clear: "if...there is a needy person among you...you must open your hand and lend him sufficient for whatever he needs." (Deut. 15:7-8).

Rabbi Sacks further examines the obligation to give. "What is the English for t'zdakah?", he asks. "There is no English. Ask one hundred Jews what is the English for t'zdakah. Fifty will say charity, fifty will say justice, and that's exactly right. T'zdakah means both charity and justice. The only trouble is, that in English, something can't be charity and justice at the same time." By way of example, Rabbi Sacks imagines that he gives someone a thousand dollars. "If it's money he owes that person, then," he concludes, "it's justice. But, if he just thinks that the person could use the money and gives it out of the kindness of his heart, then it's charity. In English," he says, "charity and justice cannot live together, they are like two magnets that drive each other apart. In Judaism, however, they're bonded in superglue and they're bonded in that one concept, t'zdakah. How come the Hebrew language can do something the English language can't?" he asks. "And the answer," he tells us, "is very simple. In Judaism, we don't ultimately possess what we own. Everything we have is ultimately God's, and God merely lends it to us, gives it to us in trust, and one of the conditions of that trust is that we share it with people who have less than we do. And that is why in Judaism charity is justice and justice takes the form of charity. That is one word," concludes Rabbi Sacks, "that has the power to change the world."

For as long as I can remember, Pesach, for me, could be summed up in the phrase in our Haggadah: *B'chol dor vador chayav adam lirot et atzmo K'ilu hu yatzah mimitzvayim*, in every generation each of us must see ourselves as if we personally went forth from Egypt. On Pesach I have always believed that we needed to be able to understand our ancestors' enslavement as our own, and to, therefore, be motivated to empathize with those who are still enslaved and act to redeem them. But, this year, I've begun to widen my view of Pesach to include the period of the omer which symbolizes our move from slavery to freedom, from redemption to revelation. Just as we are taught that as part of the process of becoming a free people, those who left Egypt were not those who entered the land, but rather those who entered the land were of the next generation. So, too, have I come to understand the period of the omer, the seven weeks from Pesach to Shavu'ot, from exodus to tithing, become an important part of the process of the formation of our people's character. In the wilderness an aspirational goal is set: A people who worships one God with particular emphasis on two values: gratitude and justice. And that has become, for me, the focus of the omer period, leading up to Sinai. If Pesach is about redemption for all, then the seven weeks until we receive Torah is about our ability to recognize the goodness in our lives, to be grateful for all that God has provided and continues to provide for us, and to work toward insuring justice for all, so that all will have reason to be grateful. These values are what make for the kind of society God strove to create when we went forth from Egypt. Without gratitude and justice our society may not be worthy of the sacred words we are preparing to receive. As Sir Moses Montefiore noted, we are worth what we willing to share with others.

Perhaps Debbie Friedman, z'l, understood this lesson well when in a song, she put together the text from the Haggadah, *B'chol don vador*, in every generation, with the words of Hillel the Sage, *im ein ani li mi li*, if I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when? Redemption and Revelation cannot exist without gratitude and justice.

Just before Pesach, we rid our homes of all chametz. Especially now, as we count the days until Shavu'ot, I'd like to suggest that we engage in a communal ridding of chametz, a word which is related to the Hebrew word chamutz, or sour. Let us rid ourselves of sour attitudes which block us from recognizing God's gifts in the universe, and let us work toward the creation of justice within our societies, so that we can all come to the foot of Mt. Sinai with clean hearts and spirits, ready to receive the gift of Torah.

I hope everyone had a good Passover holiday. After a small gathering last year, it was nice to see everyone in the kitchen preparing the Seder meal. Having family and friends around brought a sense of normality to the holiday. The Women of Shir Tikvah held a Seder on Saturday with 60 attendees. It is nice to have such great participation and we look forward to more opportunities to get together.

I would like to welcome Kay Shell to the Shir Tikvah family. Kay started working as our Office Administrator the last week of March. Kay is a widow, after losing her husband, Mark, to cancer in 2015. Mark and Kay Shell spent their 36 years together in southern Illinois and pastored the same non-denominational church for 27 years, where Kay worked as the office administrator. In the small world we live in, Kay purchased the former home of Shir Tikvah members, Caryl and Manny z"l Chudwin, in Olympia Fields in January of 2021. Kay has two adult children, Joshua- 41 years old, and Candice- 38 years old, who both live in the Ukrainian Village neighborhood of Chicago.

Kay is looking forward to meeting all our members. She is very outgoing and has brought new energy to the office. With her prior work experience, she is very comfortable in the nuance of a religious organization. As I have worked with Kay, I have realized how many words we use which are not commonly known outside our community such as yahrzeit or shiva. Kay will have a learning curve, but I have no doubt it will not take long for her to be up to speed. Kay is a great addition to our team. Please stop in and say hello.

The war in Ukraine continues and we must not let this atrocity slip from the headlines. The Russian invasion does not look to be ending soon and the continuing attack on civilians is disheartening. Our first collection of supplies was a success, collecting 1,000 pounds of medical supplies, blankets, and sleeping bags. Due to the efforts by Lana, we were able to ship the material to Poland free of charge. The shipment was delayed at the Ukraine border but is now in Lviv. Because of last week's bombing in Lviv, the shipment got delayed again but is scheduled to be delivered early this week to Kharkiv.

There remains a large demand for medical supplies in Ukraine. Therefore, we decided to have another collection to support Ukraine. For this drive we will only be collecting medical supplies. This includes first aid kits, tourniquets, ibuprofen, and Mylar thermal blankets. All these items are listed on the Amazon wish list you can connect to using the link on our flyer in the bulletin. Choose the items to equal the amount you would like to donate and select Shir Tikvah as the shipping location. If you are unfamiliar with Amazon, you can send a check for your donation to the Shir Tikvah office and write Ukraine on the check. The office will order the needed medical supplies with the proceeds. We appreciate all those who have gave to our collection and those that helped pack the supplies.

On May 20, we will be honoring Rabbi Leo Wolkow z"l with a plaque to be placed in the main sanctuary. Helen Wolkow will be joining us for the service. I grew up with Rabbi Wolkow at Temple B'nai Yehuda, along with so many others, may his memory be for a blessing. It will be nice to see plaques for Rabbi Wolkow and Cantor Altman z"l together in the sanctuary where they worked together for so many years.

On Sunday, May 22 at 4PM, we will be hosting an exhibit by photographer Paul Margolis. He is a documentary and fine art photographer, as well as a writer and lecturer. We will be viewing his exhibit "Impressions of Israel" with Paul providing his commentary. Rabbi Harari was able to arrange for Paul to visit us while he was touring in the area. This event is being underwritten by the Institute for Jewish Activism Fund and Rabbi Jonathon Wolf. We have a busy weekend planned, and this event will be a good way to wrap up the weekend.

This will be my last bulletin article except for my comments at the Annual Meeting on June 26. My work background was financial so writing articles was a challenge for me. I did enjoy writing the articles and hope you found them informative.
