Rabbi's Message

I used to love the old Saturday Night Live. Gilda Radner ranting on the weekend update as Emily Litella or Roseanne Rosannadanna, Steve Martin and Dan Aykroyd were two wild and crazy guys, Eddie Murphy kept things safe on Mr. Robinson's Neighborhood, and Dana Carvey and Mike Myers played air guitar from Wayne's basement in Joliet, Illinois. Those were the good old days. I stopped watching the show



'round about the time I went to college. And though I was among millions of Americans who tuned in to see Tina Fey's spot-on impersonation of Sarah Palin, I wasn't watching this past weekend (Nov. 12th, 2022) when comedian Dave Chappelle, who was hosting the show, delivered a monologue that gave legitimacy and power to the tweets sent out a few weeks earlier by rapper Kanye West, now known as Ye. Antisemitic tweets. But I was certainly paying attention to Sunday's headlines.

In nearly half a century, Saturday Night Live has been embroiled in a number of scandals. But I cannot remember a time when a guest host stood on stage and, on live television, went on to perpetuate dangerous stereotypes and myths about Jews. It's been four days since the monologue aired and I've yet to read a response from SNL, specifically its Jewish creator and showrunner, Lorne Michaels. Suffice it to say I am angry. I would boycott the show, but that would suggest I was still watching... An article in the Jewish Daily Forward highlighted exactly why this type of speech is so dangerous. It reads, in part:

"Chappelle, an African-American who has often satirized the Black community while at the same time mocking the serious and casual racism of whites, performed a similar tightrope act in dissecting West's antisemitism.

"I've been to Hollywood and — no one get mad at me — I'm just telling you what I saw," he said, adding a signature pause. "It's a lot of Jews. Like a lot." As the audience at NBC's Manhattan studio laughed nervously, he quickly added, "But that doesn't mean anything! You know what I mean? Because there are a lot of Black people in Ferguson, Missouri, it doesn't mean we run the place."

That joked echoed a familiar line of Jewish defense groups, who are often at pains to point out that a disproportionate Jewish presence in an industry is not an indication of a conspiracy — an age-old canard.

But Chappelle leaned harder into the joke, leading some reports on the monologue to suggest that he was justifying and defending West's antisemitism.

He said the "delusion that Jews run show business" is "not a crazy thing to think," but "it's a crazy thing to say out loud." He also said of West, "It's a big deal, he had broken the show business rules. You know, the rules of perception. If they're Black, then it's a gang. If they're Italian, it's a mob. If they're Jewish, it's a coincidence and you should never speak about it." In just a few weeks, we, the Jewish community will gather to celebrate Chanukah. In addition to marking the improbable victory of the small Maccabean army against the much larger Greek-Assyrian one, the festival is also a celebration of religious freedom. Every person in the world should be free to worship as they wish, without fear. And this year, especially, in the midst of hostility and hate, we have a responsibility to celebrate Chanukah to its fullest and make a commitment not to let statements like those made by Ye, Kyrie Irving, and Dave Chappelle shape our celebrations or our existence. I do not recall a time when Americans felt so comfortable in their hatred; so comfortable, in fact, that they don't even try to hide their disdain for others, but rather they wear it proudly, like a badge of honor. No person should be vilified for simply existing, and no stereotype should persist, spreading falsehood about any group, period. I am shocked that SNL allowed such a monologue to be used, and I am outraged that NBC gave a platform for hatred by airing such a dangerous speech. I plan to write to both entities, and I would like to encourage you to consider making your feelings known as well.

This Chanukah, let us take part in the practice of pirsumah de nisah, publicizing the miracle, by placing our chanukiyot in our windows, visible to all. May our lights shine extra bright this year, and on this festival or rededication, let us rededicate ourselves to human kindness, respect, and love. May we celebrate our religious freedom, free from hatred and threat for many years to come.

December Presidents' Message

"Israel was not created in order to disappear - Israel will endure and flourish. It is the child of hope and the home of the brave. It can neither be broken by adversity nor demoralized by success. It carries the shield of democracy and it honors the sword of freedom." —John F. Kennedy

I have just returned from a two week trip to Israel and Jordan with my mind filled with pictures and thoughts, sounds, the smells, the tastes. No longer was the Tanakh, the Jewish Bible, just an old book filled with stories of dysfunctional families, wars, laws, and the majesty of G-d; now it was alive as I walked to many of the places and felt, as we do at Pesach, that I was there long ago. We were able to see ruins from several millennia ago and to see the new developments, as Israel is a continually developing modern country. When I stood on a tel in Jaffa, the city supposedly founded by Noah's son Japtheth, and looked out to sea, I could imagine the importance of this area to the many trade routes. I thought about the archeological discoveries of ruins that go back to 4000 years ago and the many civilizations that have lived on this spot. I looked to the north and saw Tel Aviv, with the modern buildings and new construction and reminded myself that Israel is a dynamic culture that will be there for future generations to discover. At Caesarea, we saw the ruins of the magnificent city that Herod the Great had constructed. We even saw the ruins of an ancient mikvah. We stood among the ruins of an ancient synagogue and imagined the service being conducted there. And so it went...each place revealing more of our past, as well as our future, names that appear over and over again in our history: Tiberias, where Moses Maimonides is buried; Tzafet, where we talked to modern artists and viewed an old synagogue,. Even though the quarters were tight, it seemed as though each home had a sukkah. We visited Bet Shean which was first inhabited by the Canaanites 5000 years ago, and, of course, Jerusalem. I could go on and on about everything we saw on this, our second trip to Israel, but I do not want to bore you. I will say that I was apprehensive about visiting Jordan, both as a Jew and as a woman, but my fears were quickly allayed. When I stood on top of Mt. Nebo and looked across the Jordan River and the Dead Sea, I felt as if I were standing there with Moses. However, the wind was so strong, I feared I would cross over to the Promised Land without him or my husband, so I quickly descended the mountain.

During the entire trip, I kept thinking about Shir Tikvah and how our community is, in so many ways, like the ancient Jewish communities whose ruins I visited. We, too, have our differences of customs and interpretations, but we come together to support each other in times of simcha and in times of grief. During this past month, we grieved with Rabbi Harari, and soon we will be celebrating with the Levy family, as Chase will have his bar mitzvah.

Every week, Kay sends out a "This Week at Shir Tikvah" memo which lists the many activities in which you can participate. Please read it and become involved; no one needs to feel alone. In a New York Times op ed this week, Betty Rollin writes about how to talk to a widow. However, what she says really applies to all of us. Reach out and connect. Empathize. No one should be alone. And her final comment after becoming a widow: "My Christian friends sent flowers; my Jewish friends sent food. Food is better." What more can we say? Join us for some food at the Chanukah party on December 18.

On behalf of the board of the Women of Shir Tikvah, we wish everyone a Happy Chanukah and a happy and healthy secular New Year!



As many people were saying thanks this month for the richness of their lives, we were saying thanks for the delightful students we have in our Hebrew and Sunday School classes. Did you know that Darth Vader's breastplate is inscribed in Hebrew? Or that Spock's world is based on Israel with his famous salute coming from the Kohanim's blessing? That Israel is the only country created from a fantasy

novel? Or that Tolkien's elves and dwarves speak Hebrew? That the comic book was a Jewish invention, and so was nearly every superhero? We'll explore how Frankenstein is based in the legend of the golem and Kafka's cockroach story is a metaphor on Jewish alienation. Then we'll move on through America: with Bugs Bunny, a few Muppets, and Mel Brooks channeling Borscht Belt performers, with robot morality originating in Jewish philosophy, with Captain America and Superman punching out Hitler. We'll explore the Jewish sensibility and creators behind Doctor Who, The Twilight Zone, and 2001: A Space Odyssey. And we'll travel up to today, when an Orthodox superheroine pauses for Shabbat, a girl time travels with a magic tallit, and hot Jewish vampires take to the screen.

Valerie Estelle Frankel has won a Dream Realm Award, an Indie Excellence Award, and a USA Book News National Best Book Award for her Henry Potty parodies. She's the author of over 80 books on pop culture, including Hunting for Meaning in The Mandalorian; Inside the Captain Marvel Film; and Who Tells Your Story? History, Pop Culture, and Hidden Meanings in the Musical Phenomenon Hamilton. Many of her book focus on women's role in fiction. Her Chelm for the Holidays (2019) was a PJ Library book, and now she's the editor of Jewish Science Fiction and Fantasy, publishing an academic series. Outside academia, she published the popular overview, Discovering Jewish Science Fiction: A Look at the Jewish Influences in Star Trek, Star Wars, Doctor Who, DC, Marvel, and so Many More. She teaches at Mission College and San Jose City College and speaks often at conferences.
