Rabbi's Message

On February 17, Shir Tikvah participated in NCJW's "Repro Shabbat," standing up for reproductive rights in our country. Here is the sermon I delivered in honor of that Shabbat.

I first learned about abortion from an unlikely source: the movie Dirty Dancing. I remember watching the movie with my mother back in 1988 and asking what the term "knocked up" meant. It was through the eyes of Penny, the resort's dance teacher, that I first learned about abortion;

about "dirty knives and folding tables," as they referred to them. I'd learn about coat hangers later.

Every time I say that word, coat hanger, a chill runs through me. And I feel nauseous as I think about the tens of thousands of pregnant people who might die because they no longer have access to safe, legal means to terminate an unwanted pregnancy. I thought we'd solved this issue in 1973. I am saddened to learn that the fight is only just beginning...again. For forty

five years, I knew abortion as a right in this country. And yet in 2022, that right was rescinded in an act that "... violates the Establishment Clause by enshrining a particular religious view into law."

The Torah, in this week's parashat Mishpatim, or laws, clarifies that causing the termination of a pregnancy is not considered murder and Jewish law even goes on to add that abortion is not only permitted but, in some cases, is required, when the life of the pregnant person is in danger. And because Judaism views mental health and physical health as both being of equal importance, abortion may even be permitted in a case where one's mental health would be in jeopardy were a pregnancy to go full term. These

are just a few of the reasons why abortion and reproductive rights are Jewish issues.

According to NCJW: "One in four people who can become pregnant will have an abortion by the age of 45. This includes Jews, and likely members of every Jewish community, including your own. Abortion is neither theoretical nor something that happens to 'other' people. Abortion is highly stigmatized in the greater American culture and this impacts people's experiences in Jewish spaces that, intentionally or unwittingly, perpetuate the stigma...Those who need abortion access should feel supported and cared for as they attend to their own reproductive health care, and should feel comfortable speaking about their experiences if they so choose without stigma or shame."

(NCJW Sermon Talking Points, Section 3: Abortion is a Jewish Issue)

In addition to the stigma surrounding abortion in our country, there are also some assumptions, including the one regarding the individuals who have them. Did you know that 59% of people who have abortions are already parents? I imagine this is news to most of us. And this is why it's up to us to acknowledge our assumptions and to put an end to them, rendering individuals as nothing more than statistics, and forgetting that each of them has a personal story to tell. It is up to us to create a safe space for all individuals, and to support those in need in any way we can.

"The overturning of Roe will have – or has already had – a disproportionate impact on people with marginalized identities and communi-

ties that have long experienced systemic oppression in this country. The racist Hyde amendment, in effect since 1980, prohibits Medicaid funding for abortion ser-

vices..." and as a result, "a significant percentage of Black, Indigenous, and other people of color in the US have had no legal access to abortion care for decades. With the fall of Roe, Indigenous, Black, and Latino populations experienced large increases in travel time to abortion facilities, and abortion bans especially deadly for black women, who are three times more likely to die from a pregnancy-related cause than white women because of systemic racism in the medical system."

We have an obligation to act in order to ensure

access to safe abortions for all.

Jewish tradition values life. In fact, saving a life is a mitzvah that supersedes all others. But for us, life begins at birth, when a baby is outside the womb and can breathe on its own. A fetus is, as we see it, only a part of the mother, and not an independent being. And since, as we established earlier, according to the Torah, the death of a fetus is not considered murder, we have an obligation to stand up and speak out for reproductive rights and access to safe abortions for all.

There is a movement called Reproductive Justice that was founded by Black women and Black and Indigenous People of Color Women and trans and nonbinary people. "SisterSong: Women of Color Reproductive Justice Collective

defines Reproductive
Justice as 'the human
right to maintain personal bodily autonomy,
have children, not have
children, and parent the
children we have in safe
and sustainable communities.'"

On this Repro Shabbat 5783, we reaffirm our commitment to this goal, to achieving Reproductive Justice in our country and beyond so that no pregnant individual be forced to endure stigma and scrutiny from strangers, emotional and physical pain, or be forced to risk their life.

In just a few weeks, we will celebrate the holiday of Purim. Among the stories in the Megillah is the one of Vashti, who fought for autonomy over her body and the one of Esther who was not accorded the

same. "In Shushan," NCJW tells us, "the men in power made decision about what and how women and others should act, when and with whom they had sex, and when and how they got pregnant. So too, today – the right to decide whether or not to have children and on what terms those children may be raised, like when women, when all people, can exercise the most basic human rights. When we remember the unnamed women in the Purim story," [the women in Vashti's harem whose stories are never told,] "we can remember the people whose lives have been endangered and forever changed by oppressive abortion bans.

When we allow ourselves to see the parallels between the Purim story and our current political reality, we come with a deeper understanding of the urgency to fight for reproductive Justice for all."

School News

Our students, again, participated in a number of activities this month. We ended up last month literally making a timeline of events in Israel's history by using clothespins to pin the events to a line. They worked as a team examining the pictures and descriptions to determine the order in which the events happened.

At the beginning of this month, we took a break from the study of Israel to have a Tu B'Shevat Seder, during which the students got to taste different fruits and nuts while discussing the importance of trees, both metaphorically and physically.

The following session, they talked about the importance of a national anthem and learned the words to Hatikvah.



Translating Yiddish Women's Literature

Dr. Jessica Kirzane is a scholar of Yiddish Studies, specializing in questions of race, gender, and regionalism in American Yiddish fiction. She has translated two Yiddish novels by Miriam Karpilove. *Judith* was published by Farlag Press in January 2022. *Diary of a Lonely Girl, or the Battle Against Free Love* was published by Syracuse University Press in 2020. Dr. Kirzane's work to translate Yiddish women writers was featured in *The New York Times* a year ago.

After receiving her Ph.D. in Yiddish studies from Columbia University in 2017, Dr. Kirzane became the Assistant Instructional Professor at the University of Chicago. She teaches all levels of Yiddish language, as well as courses in Yiddish culture and literature. She also serves the Editor-in-Chief of <u>In geveb: A Journal of Yiddish Studies</u>.




